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The chief work of the Altar Guild is the care of the altar, and of the vestments of the priest and choir. From its membership is chosen the Choir Mother, who sees that the choir is neatly and properly vested at all services. From its membership two women are appointed for each week to see that flowers are on altar, and the altar linen clean and in readiness. This organization meets once a month, at a "covered-dish" supper.
Mrs. Jack Tobin is President of the Altar Guild.
The Ladies' Guild has been concerned, largely, with the raising of money for the support, and furtherance, of the work of the church. The Guild also visits newcomers, and, in some ways, acts as a bridge between the sick in the parish. It stands behind the vestry in all its work. It holds a regular monthly business meeting, following a luncheon, and has many social and money-making gatherings. Mrs. A. F. Stennett is president of this organization.
The Woman's Auxiliary is the national woman's organization of the church. All baptized women of the church are members. Its ultimate object is missionary. To this end, it does educational work, works with the social service agencies of the community, as far as possible, and endeavors to publicize the church in every way. It meets twice a month, and carries out a greatly diversified program. Mrs. Horatio Gates is its president.
The strictly educational department of the church is divided into three groups. The first group meets Sunday mornings at a quarter to ten. It includes all children and young people who are below college age. Mr. John Mann is superintendent of this group, and has, working with him, a staff of excellent teachers. The second group includes all young people over high school age. It meets at the second of 6:15 every Sunday evening. A light supper is served, and then a discussion group, under leadership of the rector, is carried on. The third group is an adult Bible class which meets at the rectory every Tuesday evening at 7:30. This class is also led by the rector.
There are three services held regularly every week: The Sunday morning Eucharist, at eight o'clock; morning prayer, with sermon and choir, at eleven o'clock; and the Friday morning Eucharist, at nine o'clock. Dignified and churchly music, of the highest quality is stressed in the Episcopal church, and, under the leadership of Mrs. Fred Strang, is one of the most pleasing features of our eleven o'clock service.
