STRAHORN SAYS NEW ORE STRIKES IN OPP WORKINGS

ject of reaching the surface. He has also been connecting the two shafts in the deepest workings. All this to accomplish several important things. First, to intersect the various gold-bearing veins on route; second, to effect a substantial saving in changing the transportation of ores from the eleventh level over the tramway built by former operators, to dump them

down through the chutes and through the new main underground working avenue, the eighteenth level, directly to the mill; and third, the creation of some mine ventilating, independent of the regular forced air system, from the deepest workings to the surface near the apex of the mountain.

"This work was planned after surveys of some two miles of tunnels, drifts and other openings and, so far as economically possible, to prospect for additional pay ore shoots as well as to intersect and crosscut the known productive veins which so frequently rib and enrich Opp mountain.

"These undertakings are so nearly complete that, with the almost 13,000 assays thus far made, it will soon be possible to read the bowels of that treasure house almost as an open book, so far as existing openings are concerned.

"Yesterday brought reports of a strike of \$14 ore in No. 2 level and assays of \$24.82 in five feet of foot-wall quartz in a raise from the No.

19 level. What is equally important, was the strike of a fine flow of water in No. 1 shaft about 100 feet below the 18 level. One of the most important problems in large scale Opp mine developments has been the water supply, which has been short during July, August and September in the unusually dry seasons which have prevailed for some years past.

"Also, these upraises have uncovered some fine streaks of rich milling ores in contacting the ore shoots tributary to the respective levels, notably one on the comparatively low-grade eleventh level and another a little above the eighteenth. Another 150 feet will carry the upper one to the surface and assist in blocking out the No. 2 vein which carries \$4 to \$10 ore for a width of five to seven feet. Values of the concentrates have shown a gratifying increase in the last few days."
