UNCLE SAM ISSUES STERN WARNING TO SOVIET REPUBLICS

has been a subject of hot debate on Capitol Hill and elsewhere, might be withdrawn if the Russian government does not do all in its power to halt communist activities in the United States.

The note itself, delivered by Ambassador William C. Bullitt in Moscow, did not go so far as to speak of possible breaking off of relations. It said the United States "anticipates the most serious consequences if the government of the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics is unwilling, or unable, to take appropriate measures to prevent further acts in disregard of the solemn pledge given by it to the government of the United States."

Promised Red Curb The American note yesterday called attention to the pledges which Leningrad gave to President Roosevelt in November, 1933, when Russia was recognized. In brief Russia promised to prevent communists under her control from interfering with internal affairs of the United States.

The American note called attention to the recent meeting in Moscow of the communist international, world organization of the party. Dispatches have been telling how speakers at the communist congress told of plans to intensify red activity in America.
