SPORTS HAPLESS HOLLYWOOD GIVES DUCKS SET-UP IN PENNANT TUSSELE

The change of schedule which sends the last place Hollywood Stars into the camp of the pennant-hungry Portland Ducks for a nine-game series this week may prove the decisive factor in the tight Pacific Coast league race.

Their drive toward the top halted temporarily last week by the leading San Francisco Missions, the Ducks in all probability need only to keep the Stars losing at their present rate to gain a commanding bulge over the field.

All series this week will run for nine games, with double headers next Monday, labor day.

The San Francisco Seals, perennially balked by their inability to come through in the pinches and knocked out of first place by the Sacramento Senators last week, meet the six-place Oakland Oaks here.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 27.—(AP)—President Roosevelt was described by a group of western congressmen who visited him today as disturbed about the spread in food prices between the farmer and the consumer.

A congressional resolution authorizing a trade commission investigation of profits made by middlemen handling farm products is on his desk awaiting signature.

The westerners went to the White House to urge that no reduction in the cattle tariff be authorized in reciprocal trade treaties which the administration is negotiating with various countries.

PORTLAND, Aug. 27.—(AP)—Less than six minutes saw the completion of a two out of three falls wrestling match here last night when Danny McShain, Hollywood, took the old fall over Rod Fenton, Canada.

Fenton won the first fall in 15 seconds with fists and a drop kick, McShain circled in the same way for the second fall in 35 seconds.

Both men traded punches and drop kicks for five minutes in the deciding fall, Fenton finally giving up the struggle and was pinned with a body press.

GRID OFFICIALS TO TAKE EXAMS C. O. Smith, principal of the Medford high school, today announced that there will be an annual football officials' examination at the high school building September 7 at 2 p. m.

The examination will include questions on all matters pertaining to decisions to be made by referees, umpires, linesmen and field judges, based upon the NCAA football rules for 1935.

When the results have been made known, a complete compilation of grades will be made and forwarded to every high school in the state.

This is a departure from the system used last year, when the football and basketball officials were examined together.

The two will now be handled independently, with complications sent out for each.

The Medford school uses only officials that have passed the examination in this state.
