gene Talmadge of Georgia and Justice William B. Patterson of the Maine supreme court. He also was reported to have a list of 200 prominent democrats who will sign the call for organization.

The informant quoted in the dispatch was reported to have come directly from a conference at Hearst's home, where the publisher was said to have promised newspaper support and financial encouragement. The names of Ely Douglas, Michael Wright, were suggested at the conference as heads of the ticket.

Ely nominated Smith at the 1934 democratic convention. He has criticized Roosevelt policies freely. Douglas resigned as budget director after a disagreement with Roosevelt.

WESTFIELD, Mass., Aug. 28.—(AP)—"I know nothing about it," was the reply of former Governor Joseph B. Ely of Massachusetts this morning when asked if he were under consideration to head an independent democratic party ticket.

"I have talked with no one regarding it and I have carried on no correspondence regarding such a party," Ely said.

Newspaper dispatches today said Ely and Lewis W. Douglas, former budget director in the Roosevelt administration were reported under consideration to head an independent democratic party to be formed by Bambridge Colby, secretary of state in the Wilson administration, and supported by William B. Hearst.

ATLANTA, Aug. 28.—(AP)—Governor Eugene Talmadge professed ignorance today of reported plans to form an independent democratic party of "constitutionalists" to attempt to defeat President Roosevelt in 1936.

"That's the first I've heard of it," Talmadge said.



GORE FARM CASE WAITS DECISION
Circuit Judge H. D. Norton yesterday took under advisement his decision in the hearing on objections to the confirmation of the sale under mortgage foreclosure of the W. H. Gore farm property on the Jacksonville highway to the California Joint Stock and Land Bank of San Francisco.

The petitioners averred that the \$75,100, plus approximately \$15,000 assumed unpaid taxes, bid by the Joint Stock and Land Bank, was "grossly inadequate" and would enable the bank to unjustly enrich itself at the expense of the defendants.

Testimony was introduced to show that the property, in normal times was worth from \$150,000 to \$200,000, and one of the best and most productive farms in the state.

Utility Asks Time To Take Up Notes
SALEM, Aug. 28.—(AP) The Mountain States Power company has filed petition in the state utilities department asking for a two year extension on the due date of its convertible six per cent gold notes, totalling \$449,000. The issue was payable November 1, 1935.

The extension is necessary, company officials said, because of inability to refinance at this time.
