HOWARD WINS BENDIX AIR DERBY



By PAUL MALLON. WASHINGTON, Aug. 30.—Don't mention it out loud, but about a dozen congressmen took a trip down Chesapeake Bay last week-end and gave vent to their feelings. What they said about the new deal would not be fit to print in the Congressional record, or anywhere else. Speaker Byrns was one of the group. His remarks will never appear in print—but should. President Roosevelt tilted his cigarette to a 45-degree angle when he signed the holding company bill, and said: "This is the fattest bill I ever signed."

TURNER LOSES BY MARGIN 13.5 SECS. IN TROPHY DASH

Amelia Earhart Left Far Behind in Los Angeles-Cleveland Hop—Aviator Killed at Start.

MUNICIPAL AIRPORT, Cleveland, O., Aug. 30.—(AP)—Benjamin O. Howard of Chicago was the apparent winner of the \$100,000 Bendix trophy race from Los Angeles to Cleveland today, by a margin of only 13 1/2 seconds over Roscoe Turner, famed holder of the transcontinental record. Officials of the national air races gave Howard's time for the 2,046 miles as 8:23:13, and said it was approximately 13 1/2 seconds faster than Turner's time. Only three other fliers were still believed en route at the time Howard finished. They were Amelia Earhart, Roy Hunt and Russell Thaw. The famous woman pilot, flying a plane much slower than the other racers, had long since lost her chance to equal Howard's time, and Thaw's hopes of equalling Howard expired not long after Turner landed. Hunt and Thaw were unreported since leaving the coast.

U. S. FLIERS SET FOR NATIONAL AIR RACES AND SPEED DASH



The aviation world is tuned up and ready to swoop down on Cleveland for another season of the National Air races. The event will open with the 2,000 mile Bendix speed dash from Los Angeles to Cleveland, then to New York, Col. Roscoe Turner (left) holds the transcontinental record at present and will defend it but he faces stiff competition. Howard Hughes (center), millionaire California sportsman, is to have a try at the record in his \$100,000 specially designed ship, as will the famous speedster, Benny O. Howard (right), of Chicago. The three officials will spend Monday at Port Orford, where the governor will give an address at the Labor day celebration. The party had arranged a fishing trip for Sunday.

FRANCE PONDERES ETHIOPIA STAND; PLAY WAR KILLS

Mussolini's Mock War Brings Tragedy—Australia Upholds Peace Efforts—League Meets Next Week

BOLEZANO, Italy, Aug. 30.—(AP)—One soldier was killed and two were wounded in Premier Mussolini's realistic war game today when soldiers advanced under real artillery fire. Shells and bullets were sent screaming over the heads of thousands of advancing infantry troops. The object was to acquaint the men with actual firing and to eliminate the panic into which soldiers sometimes fall when they hear the fire of their own guns overhead. Today was the first time real ammunition was used. As soon as he learned of the accident, Premier Mussolini went to the hospital to visit the two wounded men.

PROSPERITY ALONE, OR WITH REFORMS, HELD MAIN ISSUES

Creel, in Luncheon Talk, Favors 'New Order' and Social Security As Basis National Life.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 30.—(AP)—George Creel told the Commonwealth club today the crux of political discussion now is whether "recovery shall go it alone, or be accompanied by reform." The writer asserted in a luncheon address: "One school of political economic thought believes a return to prosperity is all that we should hope for and work for, that this pious aim meets every possible human need and aspiration."

(By the Associated Press) Premier Laval of France, with a "free hand" authorized by his cabinet, went to the quiet of the country to make up his mind whether France should support Italy or Great Britain in their opposing stands on the Ethiopian question.

None of the admiring congressional group said anything out loud, but one who held his fingers crossed observed to himself that the measure was faster than the president knew.

The background on the soviet difficulty is this: Mr. Roosevelt would have been very glad to get out of Soviet recognition anywhere along the route. Fundamentally he would like to dispense the Russians. He is angry because they failed to meet his good neighbor policy. But there are limits to what presidents can do.

The stock market has been going down, some observers say, on the rumor that Chairman Kennedy of the SEC might quit. Mr. Kennedy wants to go. He would have eased months ago if he could have eased himself out of his existing predicament (commonly called a job). Lately his friends in Wall street have been telling him that he is out of place, that he should retire. There has been no pressure from the top to keep him, but he will be kept.

His administration is the only one which is free from complaint. The Democrats on Capitol Hill believe Mr. Roosevelt is the smartest president they have ever seen. Even the failure of the deficiency bill is considered by them a victory. Floor Leader Robinson encouraged, through his friends, a filibuster conducted by Senator Long.

The president changes his mind every fifteen seconds about the western trip. His latest idea is to call off the return visit through the Panama canal and come back through the Pacific northwest. He will change his mind again before the ultimate decision.

BREWERIES FINED FOR SALE TACTICS

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 30.—(AP)—The Oregon liquor control commission today suspended Oregon dealer licenses of the Star Brewery company and the Northwest Brewing company for 30 days for alleged unlawful sales tactics. Both were charged with giving financial aid to retail beer establishments in violation of the Oregon liquor law.

CLAUDETTE GETS MEXICAN DIVORCE

HOLLYWOOD, Cal., Aug. 30.—(AP)—Charles Feldman, business manager for Claudette Colbert, glamorous motion picture star, today said that the actress had secured a Mexican divorce from her actor-husband, Norman Foster. The marriage of the Paris-born actress and Foster, who first gained prominence on the New York stage, was reported to have taken place eight or nine years ago when they played together in "The Barker" on Broadway.

Bain and charging Gillis with assault with intent to kill, was based on information in a written statement from Willis Billingham who admitted he was present at the shooting of Ertman, Bain said.

The executive office said the report was being completed and that it would cover all phases of the recent hearing.

TOMATO LOSS IN STORM TOO HIGH

O. O. Alenderfer, president of the Bagley Canning company, stated today that through a misreport from an attaché at the cannery at Ashland, the loss of the company's ripe tomato crop as a result of the rain storm Wednesday evening was reported in yesterday's Mail Tribune as being greater than is actually the case. The crop of ripe tomatoes was very slightly damaged by the storm, Alenderfer said, and in a check-up today, the fruit being harvested was actually running at a higher percentage of perfection than for several years past. The Ashland report stated erroneously that the loss was 15 per cent of the ripe crop.

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
