RHEINLANDER BEER LICENSE CANCELED PORTLAND, Aug. 30.—(AP)—The Oregon liquor control commission today canceled the beer wholesaler license of Rheinlander distributors and suspended for periods of from five to 10 days the licenses of eight beer retailers allegedly given financial aid by the Rheinlander distributors. The penalties take effect September 8. It was announced by the commission which held extensive hearings last month. The commission held that Rheinlander Distributors, Inc., Oregon agent for the sale of Rheinlander beer produced in Seattle, rendered "financial and material assistance" to retailers. Giving such assistance is in violation of Oregon liquor laws. The commission also found that former President E. R. DeGraff of the company "made false representations and attempts to the commission in order to induce or prevent action by the commission." In his testimony DeGraff declined to tell the commission how he spent his \$1,000-a-month expense account.

RAY TO STOP PLANES CLAIMED BY MARCONI (Copyright, 1935, by United Press) NEW YORK, Aug. 30.—(AP)—Giuglielmo Marconi, Italian electrical wizard who invented radio telegraphy today announced experiments with a secret ray which he believes will enable him to stop airplane motors high in the clouds—but the startling claim failed to impress American scientists. The military importance of such a defense weapon would, of course, be tremendous. The belief of American scientists, although none would be directly quoted on this specific point, was that Marconi's claim had a direct relationship to the impending Italy-Ethiopia war, and was meant to strike fear into possible European enemies of Italy.

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OREGON EMPLOYMENT MAKES SPECTACULAR GAINS DURING MONTH SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 30.—(AP)—Oregon employment increased substantially in July over the preceding month, and payrolls were higher, the federal reserve bank of San Francisco reported today in a survey of 113 firms which showed increases were greater than seasonal. The number of employed rose 5 per cent, and the aggregate weekly payrolls climbed 11 per cent from June. There was considerably more than usual expansion in the lumber and wood products industry, and expansion continued in the food products group, while the textile industry slowed up. Gains over a year ago were rather spectacular, employment rising 16 per cent and payrolls 45 per cent over the 1934 month. The bank's preliminary index of employment, stood at 86 per cent of the 1923-25 average, with weekly payrolls at 73 percent. Adjustment for seasonal variation brought the figures down to 80 and 71, which compared with 73 and 62 for June and 74 and 57 for May. In July last year the adjusted indices were: employment 67, payrolls 48.
