

2 ASHLAND MEN GET PRISON TERM FOR DELINQUENCY

Johnson Refutes Claim He Is 'Railroaded' — Social Standing No Excuse for Crime.

Era Johnson, middle-aged Ashland resident, who pleaded guilty to a charge of contributing to the delinquency of a minor, was sentenced to serve not to exceed three years in state prison Saturday morning by Circuit Judge H. D. Norton.

"There have been strong representations," the court said, "urging clemency in this case because of the standing of your family, and your own reputation. You have many defenders. The court will state that your high social standing is not a recommendation for clemency. Because of it, there is grounds to expect a higher regard for the moral code."

"It has been claimed by some of your defenders that you are 'being railroaded,'" continued the court. "I want to ask you, is the statement you signed the truth?"

Johnson replied: "It is the truth absolutely."

"Then those persons who claimed you were being 'railroaded' were mistaken," the court concluded.

A petition, signed by a number of Ashland residents, asking clemency for Johnson was filed with the court.

Peter Jackson Fry, attached to the district attorney's office, charged also with contributing to the delinquency of a minor, and who entered a plea of guilty, was sentenced to serve not more than four years in state prison.

"This is the worst case that has ever come to the attention of the district attorney's office," said Deputy District Attorney George Nelson.

"For the protection of the children of Ashland and Jackson county, we urge that Fry be given the heaviest possible sentence."

The court, in passing sentence on Fry said:

"Your case is particularly reprehensible—more so than that of Johnson."

Both men will be subject to the Oregon parole laws. Both made lengthy statements, admitting serious actions involving minors. A relative of Fry, in a statement to the authorities, alleged Fry had a long record for moral turpitude.

E. O. Walters, a young man, who entered a plea of guilty to burglary in a dwelling, was sentenced to four months in the county jail.

Fred Roseborough, who pleaded guilty to the larceny of a calf was meted a similar sentence.

RETURNS TO FIND HOME RANSACKED

Burglars are still busy in Medford, apparently. Eva Dobby Murry, who has been out of the city since Aug. 14, returned to her home at 1033 West Eleventh street Friday night and found the back door unlocked, and the house ransacked, she told city police.

A large amount of women's clothing was taken, and some men's clothing, suitcases, a pen and pencil set, and other articles comprised the rest of the loot.

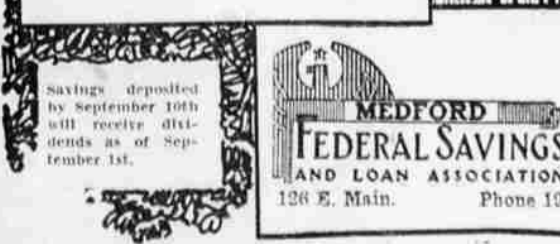

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AVIATION SCHOOL PROMOTER PLEADS GUILTY TO FRAUD

Blks Number of Valley Youths With Job and Flying Lure — Sentence Pending.

Charged with fraud in the enrollment of aviation students in a mythical aviation school, Howard T. Johnson, who operated in this city and county, under the name of Virgil DeVon Whitesell, has entered a plea of guilty. Sentence has been held in abeyance, pending official investigation of his previous police record, if any.

Johnson operated by the insertion of a want ad in newspapers, reading: "Opportunity to young men interested in aviation, a chance to make \$5 a day and bond. Must have \$20 deposit. If interested write." According to the district attorney, H. L. Nichols, 204 West Jackson street, was "interested," and gave Johnson the \$20 deposit. When the results of Johnson's forthcoming, he pleaded guilty, resulting in the arrest of Johnson.

Correspondence turned over to the authorities, indicate Johnson also blked other youths of the valley with a desire to fly, or be aviation mechanics. Some of the letters were under the heading: "The Central Point Flying Hawk Club."

It was first thought that two men were involved in the scheme, but later it was revealed that Johnson used two names.

District Attorney George A. Codding said that it has been brought to light that six youths were blked, and possibly more.

Whitesell was tipped off to the scheme when Whitesell sold courses to two brothers, and signed the receipts by different names, police said. A check up among the brothers revealed that the Johnson and the Collins signatures must have been written by the same man, and the police were notified.

Whitesell was nabbed at a Table Rock district farm house, according to officers, in the act of packing his luggage for a trip into northern Oregon. He admitted the fraud, police said, but promised to pay back every cent taken, about \$47. Of that amount, he had \$20 in his possession when arrested.

Officers were told that the idea of the alleged hoax occurred to him several years ago, when he himself was blked out of \$50 on a similar scheme. Police said that he was not without customers for his deal, in that several followed him about the county, under the impression, given out by Whitesell himself, that the "flying club" was to be exclusive, with only 35 members. He told several that there were only three openings left, police stated.

PHOENIX MAN HELD ON CHECK CHARGE

Elmer Owen Peters, 32, of Phoenix, is in the county jail on a \$1000 bond on a charge of forging checks. For the past several months, according to state police who made the arrest Friday night at Phoenix, Peters has been forging checks signing the names of prominent Medford men.

The state police have five of the checks allegedly forged by Peters each in the amount of \$10. He has waived preliminary hearing, and his case will be next referred to the grand jury.

State police said yesterday that Peters has admitted having been in similar difficulty about 10 years ago, having just finished a 10 year parole on the charge.

Eugene Golfer Meets Simmons in Quarter Finals

VISITORS OCCUPY SPOTLIGHT FIRST ROUND GOLF MEET

Eddie Simmons Defeats Tom Emmons in Close Tilt—Hammond Jr. Gives Thrill.

Bob Near of Eugene, who is favored along with several other outsiders to see final competition in the Southern Oregon golf tournament, will meet today in the quarter finals of the championship flight.

Golfers from out of town occupied the spotlight in the first rounds of the championship flight Saturday, with Near turning in a 2 and 1 win over L. Hamilton of Grants Pass; Carl Stevens of Portland defeating Earl Tully, 3 and 2; and Eddie Haiselt of Portland defeating Arnold Inman of McMinnville, 2 and 1. Simmons gained his berth in the quarter finals by winning 7 and 6 from Tom Emmons.

Those expected to make the strongest bid for the title were Simmons, Near, H. B. Bentley of Ashland, who defeated Bud Simmons, 5 and 3, and Leland Clark, who won low medal score in the qualifying rounds, and edged George Harrington out of the first match by the narrow margin of one up on the 19th. Harrington carded ten straight pars when he started the 18 hole contest, and was two up with a 36 on the first nine, halting No. 10 with another par performance. Harrington won No. 11 with a birdie to be three up, but Clark shot one under par for the next six straight, and halved No. 18 to come out all square. On No. 19 the life insurance man captured the match with a par four against Harrington's five.

The low medalist jinx, failed to keep Clark out of the running, but he will have a tough assignment in his match today with Dr. B. G. Barkwill, Ashland's leading contender. Clark's low medalist were Stevens and Bentley, who tied for second with 77, and Ed Simmons, who carded a 75.

The most unusual match of the day was the weak second-flight contest of Bob Hammond Jr. and Harrison McMahon, which ended with Hammond one up on the 19th, distinguished by his use of only three clubs, during the remarkable performance. Hammond discarded the rest of his regulation 12 clubs due to the fact that most of them went back on him in the qualifying rounds, in which he failed to earn a place in the championship flight. As he was qualifying an unemployed lie and several other penalties robbed him of every chance to make a good score.

Coming up on the green on No. 8 Hammond found himself stymied on the rim of the cup with McMahon's ball, but he used a follow-shot such as trick billiard employ, chipping McMahon's pellet out of the way and rolling into the cup. Coming up on No. 10, Hammond clubbed a shot into a tree, where the ball still remains, costing Hammond one stroke and distance.

Mrs. J. C. Thompson, who was women's low medalist with an 89, defeated Mrs. R. W. Myers of Oakland in the championship flight Saturday and is paired with Mrs. Aletha Vawter of this city today.

Ninety-six men and 18 women teed off Saturday, a faster field than ever in the history of the tournament, according to Pro Jack Hirston.

Spectators gathered and disorders were feared. Street, however, was hustled to the clubhouse and Seattle players restrained Fanning, who was intent on following Street.

The length of Street's suspension will be determined, it was said today, after Baggerly receives a full statement from Fanning.

NO-HIT, NO-RUN GAME HURLED BY WHITE SOX ROOKIE

Vernon Kennedy Reaches Baseball Hall of Fame, With Cleveland Indians the Victim.

CHICAGO, Aug. 31.—(P)—A no-hit no-run game—the first in the major leagues since Sept. 21, 1934 and the first in the American circuit in four years—today admitted twenty-six year old Vernon Kennedy of the Chicago White Sox to baseball's hall of fame. He blanked the third-place Cleveland Indians, 5 to 0.

Only four Indians reached first base, all on passes. Kennedy completed his brilliant performance by striking out Joe Vosmik, the league's leading hitter, with the count 3 and 2 and Earl Averill, who had walked on first base.

There were only two hard hit balls during the entire contest. Al Simmons making a spectacular diving catch of Galatzer's hard smash in the ninth and Washington taking a line drive off the bat of Roy Hughes in the eighth.

Paul Dean of the St. Louis Cardinals pitched the last no-hitter in the major leagues, stopping the Brooklyn Dodgers without a safety last September. The last American league hurler to turn the trick was Bob Burke, Washington southpaw, who beat the Boston Red Sox on Aug. 8, 1931.
