New Central Teacher—Miss Laura Pastorino of Medford has accepted a position as fifth grade teacher in the Central Point school. She is a graduate of the Medford high school, and the Southern Oregon Normal school. She left yesterday for a vacation in San Francisco before taking up her duties.

Daniels and Riehl Fishing—T. E. "Dan" Daniels, and Al. Riehl, factory representative of the Remington Arms company, after spending a part of the past week in fishing in the Umpqua divide country, have circled around and are at Diamond Lake today. Daniels will be back in his office tomorrow. Riehl will be remembered as one of the ace shots in the Oregon State trapshoot held here in June.

CCC's to Celebrate—Labor day will be celebrated in the camps of Medford CCC district, and all the camps will have a special dinner or some other form of celebration, according to district headquarters. All members will be excused from work except those detailed for camp police and necessary emergency work. Many of the enrollees are planning to participate in community celebrations on the day of rest and recreation.

Ed. Kellys Have Son—Word was received here yesterday by Attorney and Mrs. E. E. Kelly that their son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Edward C. Kelly of Portland, are the parents of a son born Aug. 30. He has been named Edward James. Mrs. Kelly is the former Mary Greiner, who has since been prominent in newspaper work at Washington, D. C. conferred to Portland to be PWA adviser for Oregon. Edward James has a brother, Bernard, and a sister, Norman.

SUSPECTED THIEF JAILED HERE HAS CRIMINAL RECORD

Willard Howell Garner, now being held in the county jail for the federal grand jury in Portland, on a charge of violation of the Dyer act in transporting a stolen auto across the state line, has a long criminal record, according to word received here yesterday by state and city police from the department of criminal investigation of California.

According to the bulletin, Garner has been known at various times as Willard Howell Garner, Bill Garner, and Edward Herbert Peseley, the name that he gave when first arrested here on August 29. The record shows that he was arrested in Pittsburgh, Penn., as a suspicious character in 1920. On March 26, 1926, he was arrested in Columbus, Ohio, on a charge of bribery, and compounding a felony. He was held for the grand jury and given 90 days in the workhouse on the first charge, and given a fine of \$500 and costs on the second. He escaped from the workhouse on August 29, 1926.

He was later arrested in Columbus again for auto theft, and for the escape. He appeared before the grand jury, was given a fine of \$600 on the auto theft charge and ordered to the workhouse again for six months on the escape charge.

He was arrested the next time in Washington, D. C., in July of 1932, and sent to the asylum and jail on an assault charge, for 45 days, and given a fine of \$50. In December of the same year he again ran afoul of the Washington authorities, on a charge of assault and an attempt to commit rape.

In 1933 he was picked up for investigation at Springfield, Ill., as a suspicious character in connection with bad check writing, and later in the year he was nabbed by coast authorities at Sacramento, on a grand auto theft charge. He later spent three months in the county jail on that charge, being released on the 16th of January of 1934.

On January 1st of this year he was arrested in Reno, Nev., on a counterfeit charge, and served time in the county jail. It was only June 12 until he was again in trouble, when he was picked up for grand theft in Sacramento, but the case was dismissed.

When arrested here he was accompanied by two women, one of whom he claimed to be his wife. This the woman denied. Both were released after investigation.

TRAIL WOMAN INJURED WHEN STRUCK BY AUTO

Violet Abel, Trail, was slightly injured yesterday morning about 9 o'clock, when struck by a car driven by Joseph J. O'Hara of San Diego, about three miles south of Trail, according to a report made to city police by O'Hara. She was crossing the highway on foot, and emerged from behind a parked mail truck just as the O'Hara machine came by, he said.

Although her condition was not thought to be serious, she received a contusion of the scalp, and abrasions and bruises on the elbow and the heel.
