PORTLAND BUTTER MARKET STRONG

PORTLAND, Sept. 3. (AP)—Local butter markets showed a good demand all during last week, and the post-holiday movement today continued strong. Supplies of fresh goods are somewhat limited and shipping orders are being assembled by drawing on storage goods. Net withdrawals from storage during last week amounted to 17,250 pounds, leaving a balance of 543,924 pounds, much higher than existed last year at this time. Egg market tone was steady, with a good volume of shipping orders, and a comparatively light volume of receipts. More than 1150 cases were withdrawn last week from storage to fill orders. Balance in storage is now 38,770 cases.
