side won much recognition. He was the originator and chairman of the first municipal vice commission of Chicago, and was a staunch supporter of the late Ella Flagg Young in her work.

In Oregon he devoted his intense interest to children's hospitals and to prison reform.

Mrs. Sumner and two daughters survive.

Bishop Sumner was in Medford last May 5, spending several days in the community after administering confirmation at St. Mark's Episcopal church, which brought him to southern Oregon annually.

He was very fond of this part of his diocese, and preferred to stay here as many days as possible on his many visits. As in other parts of the state and nation his work in child welfare and reform was greatly admired here and he was loved and respected by everyone in the vicinity who knew him.

News of his sudden death was a severe shock in the community.

and national governments and independent supreme court to interpret and apply that constitution; second, the distribution of final responsibility, legislative, executive and judicial, in their respective branches, and third, the reservation of certain rights of the individual which no government, national, state, or local shall infringe.

"Anything else in the constitution may be changed, by amendment. But if these essentials are undermined, by either amendment or usurpation, not only is the constitution gone, but American institutions and liberties are gone with it," the speaker insisted.

Governmental deficits; a controversial point in American politics, were discussed in detail by Mr. Read, who pointed out that they can be and are liquidated in three ways: by repudiation, by inflation or by taxation. The first two are economically odious and socially despicable leaving the road of taxation as the only decent course.

But when deficits get too high (and public deficits have a habit of getting more deficits) politicians cannot with impunity translate deficits to taxation—I is politically the inexpedient thing to do.

The speaker insisted that it is the right of citizens to denounce legislation and programs which they believe inimical to the welfare of their community, state and nation.

In concluding his address today, Mr. Read outlined a definite program as outlined by large and small business interests of the nation. This "affirmative" program cannot be as firm as the program as many of the impractical and idealistic plans which give something for nothing, based on the premise that equality of opportunity means equality of reward irrespective of merit, he said.

The program calls for recognition of the fact that "wealth can only be created by production and the exchange of that production and that the distributable part of wealth lies not so much in the distribution of means of production as it does in the things produced." A plea for legislative stability, economy in government, and sound currency is also embodied in the eleven-point program of the United States Chamber of Commerce.

In his concluding remarks, Read asked for an active and articulate participation in national affairs on the part of individuals and such organizations as the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce, B. E. Harder, presided at today's meeting.

COUNTIES UNITE TO PLAN ROGUE RECREATION AREA

As a result of the meeting of the state planning board at Gold Beach over the last week-end it was decided to have the county planning boards of Jackson, Josephine and Curry cooperate in presenting a definite proposal to the state board for establishing a so-called primitive area along the Rogue river.

County Judge Day, chairman of the local county planning board, has appointed T. E. Daniels and Karl Janouch, as a committee of two to represent this county. They will join with two representatives from each of the other two counties in formulating the final plan.

At the Gold Beach meeting the sentiment was extremely strong for the perpetuation of the natural beauties and recreational advantages of Rogue river, and not have it go the way of so many fish streams on the Pacific coast, which have fallen before the advance of civilization and heavy tourist travel.

In general the plan is not to support any highway construction up the Rogue river, on either side, but to set apart about 40 miles along the river from Ilwaco to Grants Pass, about ten miles in width, as a sort of natural recreational and sporting paradise. Only so-called erect roads and trails would be constructed in this area, adapted particularly to fire fighting and slow transportation from place to place on the part of sportsmen. It has been the history of all fishing streams that a permanent highway built along its banks, spells the end of the sport.

Local sportsmen are reported very enthusiastic over the plan. They believe such a preserve along Rogue river, with the forest areas and large private estates already there, will make Rogue river a mecca for fishermen and hunters for an indefinite period in the future.

KENNETH WOOD TO COACH DEBATERS

Kenneth Scott Wood of Portland has been appointed to the staff at Medford high school this year where he will coach debate and teach public speaking, journalism, history, and civics. He will succeed Rex E. Robinson who will teach this year at Eastern Oregon Normal school at La-Grande.

Wood is a graduate of Oregon State college, where he debated four years, participating in a total of 78 inter-collegiate contests with over 40 colleges and universities. Out of his total number of debates he lost only 18 decisions. He was formerly employed as a radio announcer at KOAC, the state-owned radio station in Corvallis, where he broadcast daily news.

Mr. Wood and his wife arrived in Medford last week and have taken up residence.
