The work will mean operating the local relief offices for the next several weeks under only a skeleton staff until further executive orders.

Public canneries throughout the valley, through which thousands of cases of perishable produce are being put up daily for winter use, will not be affected.

The closure was effected here in 1933 by the county administration during the seasonal employment period, and some operations were curtailed in 1934 when the SEERA program was first getting under way.

Earlier this summer about 25 important projects were discontinued with the return of better times.

The local administration will announce a decision tomorrow, it was announced, on the policy to be maintained here in accordance with the instructions from Portland.

There is a strong probability right now that the ailing Democratic floor leader of the house, William B. Bankhead, may never return to congress. He said in a letter to the house at the close that he would return "God willing."

If he does not, there will be a strong demand for a new leader next winter to replace Acting Leader Taylor of Colorado, who carried on this session. Mr. Taylor does not care much about the job.

A sub-rota preparatory contest for it is already looming up in the Rules Chairman O'Connor and Chairman of Virginia.

It is not fall into the trap of being misled by the utilities interests as they go to take the new law literally just because two of the services Mr. O'Connor's committee have already filed applications under it.

The general application on the inside here is that probably 90 per cent of the utilities companies will co-operate or appear so, but that a few will bitterly oppose it. And the 10 per cent will be quickly getting on the 2 per cent list of the time.

There is no chance to stop the legislation that the uncertainties of these new regulations will be a long source of legislation.

President Roosevelt's new law is probably not so much a new law as a new interpretation of the old TVA constitutionality.

Present plans call for reopening of relief stations, if necessary, when the seasonal employment is over.

It was pointed out that every relief activity will be temporarily suspended except relief canneries.

The hop yard and other employment is expected to last another three or four weeks.

Many of those on relief in the Willamette valley and in southern Oregon already have gone to work in the fields. Many others, however, have made no effort to take this work when it has been offered them.

With the closing of the relief stations there will be a great deal of unemployment, and it is not without food and other assistance.

It was announced that each relief office probably will continue to be staffed by its manager and perhaps one crew worker.

YOUNG PRISONER MAKES GETAWAY, IS SOON RETAKEN

Robert Riley, 13, a state reform school escape, held in the county jail pending return to that institution, escaped from the county jail last night by stealing the key to the "front door" of the building from Acting Jailer George Inlow's pants, while he was sleeping.

The lad was captured this morning by the Ashland police, and returned to the county jail, the sheriff said. Young Riley was "picked up" here by the authorities a week ago, and has been held awaiting the arrival of reform school guards to return him. Last night he was given his supper in a cell near the women's ward. The door to his cell was left unlocked, and some time after midnight Riley crept into the jailer's room where the latter was asleep with his trousers hanging on a nearby chair. The youth removed the key, and also took a pocketbook containing \$1 and a few pennies. He did not take a wallet containing about \$5.

With the key it was an easy matter for the boy to open the jail door, and make his way out of the courthouse.

Riley was not placed in the main felony tank of the jail, and his escape was not discovered until breakfast time this morning.
