

### 32-CENT BUTTER SEEN IF DEMAND CONTINUES GOOD

PORTLAND, Sept. 6.—(AP)—Continued dry weather and steady consumption of butter were the underlying causes of an advance in the butter market this week. If the advance is sustained, and is followed by irregular merchants, consumers may find a grade butter selling for 32 cents a pound, and B grade at 31 cents. Trading interest is centered on top crops.

The egg market is practically the same as last week, and consumers are finding that the best buy, quality and price considered, is to be made in small grades. Overalls will be retailing at 96 cents a dozen; extras, large, 34 and 35 cents; dozen, medium, 32 and 33 cents; standards, large, 32 and 33 cents and extra small, 23 and 24 cents.

The cheese market remained firm and there has been an advance in practically all package goods. High scoring mild cheese will be retailing around 21 cents and 23 cents a pound, fancy sharp 29 cents and 31 cents, depending on age.

Live poultry receipts were light in volume today, with supplies remaining adequate for requirements. Pay quotations remained unchanged locally, and the market tone is steady. Best call is for broilers and medium weight fowl.

In the dressed poultry division the market tone tends to be easy on roasters.
