SACRAMENTO, Cal., Sept. 6.—(UP)—Governor Frank Finlay Merriam today was notified of organization of the first "Merriam for President" club.

Albert H. Miller, of Amusa, Cal., notified the governor that the club had been formed in that city "to assist in conveying to the nation and to you the widespread desire of our people that you be their standard bearer in the forthcoming presidential election."

Governor Merriam shortly will visit the national convention of the American Legion in St. Louis. Political circles said the visit was intended as a trial balloon to determine the attitude of the Legion toward the governor as a national Republican candidate.

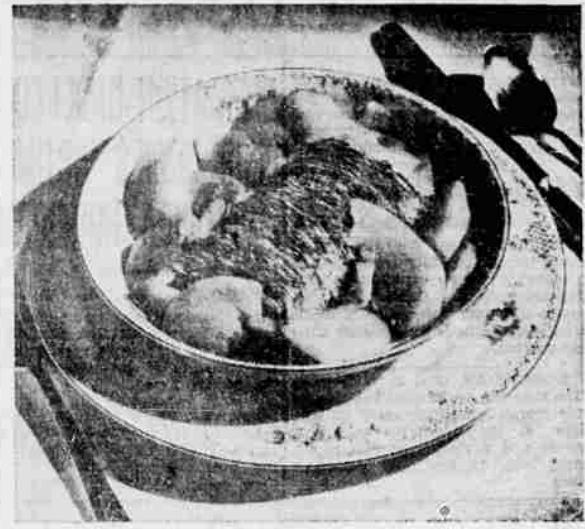

Peaches in Delicious Breakfast Dish



To start the day off right, there is nothing like a good breakfast. Fruit and cereal are considered essential, and a combination of the two foods is delicious.

TERRE HAUTE, Ind., Sept. 4.—(UP)—Powers Haggood, Indianapolis, and Leo Vernon, Madison, Wis., socialist organizers, were arrested last night while on the picket line at the Terre Haute Malleable and Manufacturing company plant.

Aaron Gilmartin, executive secretary of the Socialist and Labor Defense League, also was seized.

The trio was held without bond on vagrancy charges.

The picket line was that of workers at the Malleable who went on strike several weeks ago.

Earlier in the day, pickets at the Columbian Enameling and Stamping company plant dispersed after the arrest of Carl Wilson, 25, Terre Haute, on a charge of impersonating an officer.

The Columbian plant was focal point of a paralyzing general strike here July 22. Martial law was declared in the area.
