

HENDERSON NOW DIRECTOR GRADE SCHOOL ATHLETES

Russell Achison Junior High Coach — Veteran Given Promotion For Fine Work

Announcement of the promotion of Ray Henderson, for several years the coach of athletics at the Junior high school here, to the position of physical education coordinator and director of play-ground athletics in all of the grade schools in the city, at an increase in salary, will be welcomed by his hundreds of friends in Medford.

The promotion was announced yesterday by Superintendent of Schools E. H. Hedrick, who praised Henderson for his fine work in the past. Hedrick stated that the promotion of Henderson comes as the result of long anticipated plans to provide a much wider scope of physical education in the lower schools.

"Henderson has shown," said Supt. Hedrick, "through his success in handling boys, that he is eminently suited to handle the program. He will have entire charge of all the physical education and athletic programs in the Jackson, Lincoln, Roosevelt and Washington schools. He will maintain his headquarters at the Junior high building, where he will continue his regular teaching duties."

To fill the position of coach at Junior high, vacated by Henderson's promotion, Hedrick announced that Russell Achison, assistant freshman coach in football and basketball at Oregon State last year, will take over the coaching duties.

Achison has had considerable experience both in playing and coaching, and will probably work into the position nicely, Hedrick said.

In addition to his coaching duties, Achison will also act as instructor in history, vocations and industries, and will be debate coach in the Junior high school. In athletics, he will work directly under Coach Bowerman of the Senior high school. Bowerman will also keep an eye on the physical education work in the grade schools, it was announced.

GAS HEAT RATES WILL BE LOWERED

The Southern Oregon Gas corporation yesterday filed new rate schedules with the public utility commissioner according to D. E. York, general manager for the company.

Rates affected are only heating rates, both domestic and commercial, and represent reductions running from twenty to fifty-one percent, according to Mr. York.

Reductions in other rates are to follow in the near future as Mr. York states the policy of the company is to pass on to the consumers the savings from lower operating costs which will follow completion of the reconstruction program now being carried out.

The gas corporation has been quietly rebuilding its plants in all the cities they operate in, and has spent a good many thousand dollars getting the system in good mechanical condition.

MORE U. S. COIN TO MEDFORD S. AND L.

J. H. Fletcher, secretary-manager of the Medford Federal Savings and Loan association, reported Saturday that the association had just received its third call from the United States treasury in the amount of \$25,000. This brings the total of the investment of the United States government in shares in this association up to \$85,000, he said.

These funds participate in the assets and earnings of the association exactly the same as savings invested by private shareholders of this community, and are invested in first mortgages on improved real estate in this vicinity.

Mr. Fletcher further stated that there is considerable inquiry for residential loans in this community, and during the past few weeks inquiry for loans for construction purposes have been steadily increasing. A similar condition in increased demand for loans for residential construction prevails throughout the entire country.

PARK CHIEF PAYS VISIT TO CRATER

Arno B. Gammeier, director of national parks from Washington, D. C., is expected to arrive at Crater Lake national park today (Sunday) accompanying a senate committee which is making an inspection of all national parks of the country, according to word received yesterday in Medford.

Mr. Gammeier was originally scheduled to visit Medford, and was to have been the honor guest here of the Crater club, but a letter recently received from the director announced that through changes in his plans he will be unable to come to this city. He expressed his regret at being unable to attend a banquet that had been planned for him Tuesday night by the Crater club.

He was expected to arrive at Crater lake from Mount Rainier, and his itinerary was expected to take him south through Klamath Falls after his stop at Crater lake.

MEDFORD SCHOOL BUILDINGS READY FOR OPENING DAY

Due to the fact that the Medford school district has been operating on a cash basis this summer, the first time in five years, considerable repairs have been made in the school buildings in the city throughout the holidays. It has been announced by Superintendent E. H. Hedrick. The schools open tomorrow.

New sewers and toilets have been put in in several of the grade schools, play sheds and bicycle sheds have been repaired and repainted. At the Senior high school new asphalt flooring material has been laid on the roof, in the typing room, and is to be put down in the office as soon as it arrives. The flooring is a new type, said to be the most durable made, and comes in an attractive red and white tile mixture on a black base.

All of the floors in all of the schools have been refurnished and many have been refinished. At the Roosevelt school, a new door has been cut into the English room to the library, so that the English teacher can more easily supervise activity in the library.

Other improvements have been made to yards and buildings in all of the schools of the city.

PACKERS SWAMPED BY RUSH OF CROP, WILL TOIL TODAY

Most of the packing houses in the city will be running full blast today, as they have been late in the erections all through last week, due to a peculiar condition which has arisen here, according to a prominent Medford fruit man. Heavy hauling is going on from many orchards, bringing more fruit into the plants at one time than can possibly be handled by the washing and grading equipment.

The congestion at the packing sheds is not due to labor shortage, but to the fact alone that too many farmers are sending in their fruit at once, the fruit man stated. He pointed out that the condition was apparently brought about by unseasonable early length of time tends to spoil their shipping quality.
