NEW HIGH COACH SHY OF VETERANS AND HE'S GLOOMY

Tomorrow, the opening day of school, will see the first call for football at the Senior high school when the new coach, Bill Bowerman, takes up his duties. Bowerman expects between 40 and 50 to answer the initial call, with more expected to report as soon as the fruit harvest is over. Prospects are gloomy. In keeping with an old Medford tradition, Coach Bowerman admits they're gloomy. But beneath that gloom are a few glimmers of light with a promise for a few big men out, some from last year's squad and some transfers into the district. Veterans will be few and far between. The only regular back will be Kunzman at end, and Smith in the backfield. Lewis, another back, saw action last year, as did Estinger, Maruyama, and Dickinson. All will probably see plenty of the hard going this year. The points where Bowerman's team looks weak on paper is at center, and one end. Kunzman will be able to hold down one end quite nicely, and big Ray Estinger will probably get a chance at the other wing. But that leaves no reserves. Switching Estinger from center, where he substituted last year, leaves that position absolutely barren, with only green seen available to work into the position. To offset this difficulty Bowerman is working on a new centering system of his own device, but it has not yet been perfected. Tactics will have to be gotten for positions that all of the available material. The point here looks a little better, with Dickinson, back, transferred to line position from the backfield. In the system the line is broken up as running guards is one of the big men, and the position is one of the most important to the team.
