HUSSONG STUDIES SPIDERS HERE FOR FEDERAL REPORT

Two years ago when the sensational scare of the poisonous Black widow spider held first page of the newspapers, scientists of the biological division of the Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C., started gathering facts and data of this much-feared arachnid to publish in a general symposium. E. M. Hussong, naturalist



and teacher in Medford senior high school was asked to report upon "The Arachnids of Jackson County, Oregon."

Mr. Hussong has completed the study during the present summer vacation and of it states: "After two years of careful examination and identification of the spiders, which many others have brought to me and I myself have collected, there appears to be only one, the black widow that can inflict serious injury by its bite. In all, forty-some species have been found; two small, beautiful emerald green ones, nine with scarlet and red markings, yellow and tan-colored, gray and brown, buff ones, dark and light striped ones, sand spiders, wolf spiders, spiders that slide off like a crab, long-legged, ill-smelling ones, the harvest spiders, horny-backed fellows, a few hairy ones—all very interesting to me at least, yet none but the Black Widow or Shoe Button spider known to be harmful."

"One red spider does slight injury to garden crops; all are great insect eaters of the fly and gnat kind. The Black Widow and her young when kept in captivity feed upon the body juices of earwigs, leaving the empty leathery skins to stivel up. The Wolf Spider pounces upon her prey like a hungry coyote. The porch spider is very liable to drop down by a single line of silk into your lap as you sit in the hammock reading, yet her intentions are innocent—she has an eye out for the news."

 his major holding, at the time of his death.
 His fortune which a few years ago was estimated at around \$300,000,000 had dwindled, yet friends said the oil king could not say within a sum of \$5,000,000 the actual total of his wealth.

The story of Doheny is studied with peak accomplishments and not a few marked disappointments. He won fame as the discoverer of vast oil resources, and notoriety as one of the key figures in oil reserve scandals of the Harding administration.
 Attention centered on Doheny in connection with a senate probe of leases involving the Elk Hills and Teapot Dome naval reserves, which had been granted by Albert B. Fall, secretary of the interior.
 Doheny and Fall were indicted on charges of conspiracy to defraud the government in the transfer of the Elk Hills lease. Fall allegedly receiving \$100,000 from his old friend, Doheny, whereby operation of the Elk Hills field was turned over to the Doheny-controlled Pan-American Petroleum company.
 Doheny contended the money was merely a loan and not to be connected with the lease transaction. Fall was convicted and Doheny was acquitted.

THREE RIVERS, N. M., Sept. 9.—(AP)—Shocked and grieved, in his own words, Albert B. Fall today said of the death of Edward L. Doheny, "I regret that Ed did not live to repair some of the wrongs being perpetrated at the present time."
 Speaking from his bed, the aging Fall obviously referred to new steps

being taken by Doheny interests to eject him from his celebrated ranch. "In good health and soundness of mind," continued Fall, "he (Doheny) would not permit some of the things that are going on." Doheny's assistants recently insisted he was aware of their course of action.
 Death's division of the famed friendship of Fall and Doheny, youthful prospectors together and later key figures in the oil scandals, however, found Fall calm.
