

CORVALLIS -(Spl)-A number of short and timely discussions of topwith plenty of opportunity for ques-tions, is planned for the annual Oregon State Poultry convention to be held at Oregon State college Thurs-day, September 26, according to A. G. Lunn, head of the poultry depart-ment at the college.

The program, as announced by Professor Lunn, will include a discussion of "Vitamin D. Potency of Pish Oils" by Dr. J. R. Haag, animal nutrition specialist, O. S. C.; and "The National Flock Improvement Plan" by H. E. Crosby, extension specialist in poultry bushandry, who has just returned from a meeting of the Pederation of State Record of Performance associations in Chicago, in connection with working out of the final details of this plan.

Professor Lunn will tell of the methods used at the famous Mt. Hope farm in Massachusetts in im-proving the size of eggs. M. Wayne Miller of the western Washington Experiment station at Puyallup will discuss recent experimental work discuss recent experimental work in poultry feeding carried on at that station, and Dr. W. T. Johnson, poul-try pathologist of the O. S. C. experi-ment station will wind up the pro-gram with a discussion of poultry disease control.
