BOWERMAN SEEKS SEPT. 28 CONTEST TO SEASON SQUAD

Coach Bill Bowerman of the Medford high school announced last night that he is negotiating for a game to be played Sept. 28 in this city, so as to give his men a definite objective in the first weeks of practice. If the alumni is willing to put a team on the field on that date, they may have the game, but if they are not heard from immediately, an outside game will be arranged.

Work started in earnest last night with some light scrimmages. Most of the work was concentration on plays, however, with dummy scrimmage taking considerable time. Before the practice session, Bowerman called the men into one of the rooms, and had a heart-to-heart talk with them. He told that absolutely no position on the team was sewed up, and that each man out, regardless of size, weight, height, experience or any other consideration had an equal chance at a position.

"If any of you want a position, come on out and fight for it," Bowerman said. "Football players come in all sizes and shapes, and if you show me you've got the stuff, you'll get the job."

During the meeting, the coach introduced his two assistants, who will help him with the work this year. Brenton Finch, former principal of the Junior high school, and assistant line coach in 1934, will again fill that position. In answer to the introduction, Finch assured the men that now was the time to win their games; that hard work now would make a tremendous difference when the season gets in full swing.

Ed Kirtley was introduced as backfield coach, a position he held under Burgher. Kirtley said several compliments to the new coach, and urged that the team members give him all their support. The assistant coach appointments were made by Bowerman so that each could handle his own section of the team while Bowerman could look on and survey the progress, and give personal attention to individuals.

FRED PERRY GIVEN SEVERE DRUBBING TO END NET REIGN

FOREST HILLS, N. Y., Sept. 11.—(AP)—The two-year reign of Great Britain's great Fred Perry as United States singles tennis champion was ended this afternoon when Wilmer Allison, 31-year-old Texas veteran, defeated Perry in straight sets, 7-5, 6-3, 6-3, before a capacity crowd of more than 14,000 in the West Side club's stadium.

By virtue of his victory Allison gained the right to meet Sidney Wood, Jr., of New York in a best of five sets contest to be played tomorrow. Wood made his way to the final today at the expense of Billy Grant of Atlanta, winning in four sets, 6-2, 4-6, 12-10, 6-2.

Allison virtually played Perry off his feet in the first set. He outplayed the defending title holder, 14 to 5. Three times Perry stopped play and appealed to the crowd to remain quiet. In the seventh game Perry fell and landed hard on his side reaching for a low shot. For a moment it appeared he was hurt. Allison clinched the set by breaking Perry in the twelfth game.

Allison made a runaway of the second set, winning five straight games. Perry obviously felt some pain from his fall and repeatedly rubbed his side. The Briton came to life, however, and won three games in a row to pull up to 3-5, but Allison went out beyond service in the ninth game, winning the set, 6-3, and the crowd went wild.

PETE DECORATED WITH RED FRINGE FOR MAT BATTLE

Peering out from behind a growth of House of David whiskers tinged with red to indicate the source of his temperamental nature, Pete Belcastro, the Weed Wildcat, returned from northern California yesterday "in the best condition of my life" and full of the old spark regarding his forthcoming championship struggle with Toots Estes of Honolulu.

With a promise to wear his facial impediments into the ring, Belcastro, looking like the ringleader of a crusade against safety razors, clamped his teeth when told that Estes will be unable to stake his Hawaiian Island championship belt. "I think he's yellow," Pete declared, although reminded that officials at Honolulu prevented Toots from defending his title in foreign lands.

Belcastro agreed, however, to go through with the title bout, in which his Pacific coast junior heavyweight crown will go to the winner, and as a guarantee he left his silver and gold belt, which he said he values far more at \$100, in the Mail Tribune strong box. It will be presented to the victor Thursday night at the Armory.

With fight time approaching, Joe Hubka of Nebraska, billed to meet Danny Savich of Salt Lake City in the other half of the main event, is still training vigorously. He plans an attack of speed and says he has several new wrestling maneuvers with which he hopes he can whip the stocky ex-University of Utah footballer.

A grudge against the fans, who booed him out of the ring last week, promises to kindle plenty of fireworks on the spot of Bob (Marine) Kennaston of Gold Hill when he tangles with Frank Sutey of Arizona in the 20-minute opener.

The promoter said ticket sales indicate one of the biggest houses of the year.

HONESTY IS BEST SAY EX-ATHLETES

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 11.—(UP)—Three ex-athletes of the University of Southern California—which hasn't won a football title in three years—fairly stunned the collegiate athletic world last night with a proposal that "Honesty is the best policy" and the suggestion college footballs be paid in cash wages.

The idea was advanced jointly by Jesse Hibbs, Trojan all-American tackle of 1929; Russ Saunders, all-American quarterback of 1929; and Gelus Shaver, a slightly diluted all-American fullback of 1931.

The gist of the suggestion was: Pay football players straight monthly wages—about \$150 per. Pay all players the same salary, thus avoiding the "taint of professionalism." Eliminate extra curricular and faintly hypocritical "jobs" as ringing the chapel bell, mowing the dean's lawn and washing down the statuary twice a week.

VERSATILE BACKS SEEN ON WEBFOOT STARTING LINEUP

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, (Sp.)—The University of Oregon's green-shirted Webfoots will turn loose a widely diversified running and passing attack this fall that promises to be even more spectacular than the damaging thrusts of the Webfoots' great 1933 backfield quartet of Parke, Gee, Temple and Mikulak.

Prink Callison, ready to start his fourth year as head Webfoot grid coach next Saturday, September 14, will unleash a half dozen versatile backfield men this fall, all capable of carrying the ball, passing and kicking. His tentative first string lineup will put three of these triple-threaters on the field at the same time.

Much of the success of the Webfoot offense will depend upon the showing of big Walt (Blondie) Back, 190-pound left halfback. Back, used last year as reserve fullback, is slated to fill the regular left half post this fall. He is unusually fast for his weight, quick on his feet, and can kick and pass with the best in the conference.

Flanking Back at the other half-back berth will be Frank (Bud) Goodin, 185-pound sophomore. Goodin had no chance to show his wares as a freshman, due to injuries, but is rated by Webfoot coaches as an outstanding prospect. He is one of the fastest men on the squad and shines both as a passer and kicker.

Still a third three-way threat in the Webfoot backfield will be Frank Mischek, fullbacking "crusher" play specialist. Mischek, in addition to his line-smashing activities, is a long-distance punter and can take his turn handling aerial tosses. Johnny Hetschman, 170-pound letterman quarterback, will stick to his specialty—blocking—as the fourth regular back.

Other triple threats whom Callison can insert, are Bobby King and Dale Lasselle, lightweight sophomore left halfbacks, and Jerry Donnell, big reserve fullback and the squad's No. 1 punting ace.
