

NEWLAND IS MADE NATIONAL OFFICER OF MAIL CARRIERS

riers' association and a personal honor to R. A. Newland of this city, one of the oldest carriers in point of service in southern Oregon, was announced today upon receipt of word from Frank P. Page, state secretary of the Oregon Letter Carriers' association at Oregon City, that Newland has been appointed national state vice-president. The office is one of 48 that functions directly under Edwin Gainer of Muncie, Ind., national president, representing each state of the union.

In the letter of appointment, State Secretary Page described Newland as

"standing head and shoulders above any other possible candidate in the state." The appointment was made by National President Gainer, following Newland's election by the Oregon delegation of 60 at the national convention of the Letter Carriers' association, held September 2-8 at Cleveland, Ohio.

The oldest carrier in point of service at the Medford postoffice, where he entered the service in July, 1913, as a regular city carrier, Newland has had an active part in the development of the Letter Carriers' association in this district and in the state.

He was chosen first district manager in 1929, of district No. 4, which comprises Medford, Ashland, Grants Pass and Klamath Falls. In 1933 he was elected state president of the association, serving in 1933 and 1934, and presiding over the state convention held last year in this city.

Mrs. R. A. Newland is state president of the ladies' auxiliary of the Letter Carriers' association, having been re-elected to that position this year at the state convention at Baker.

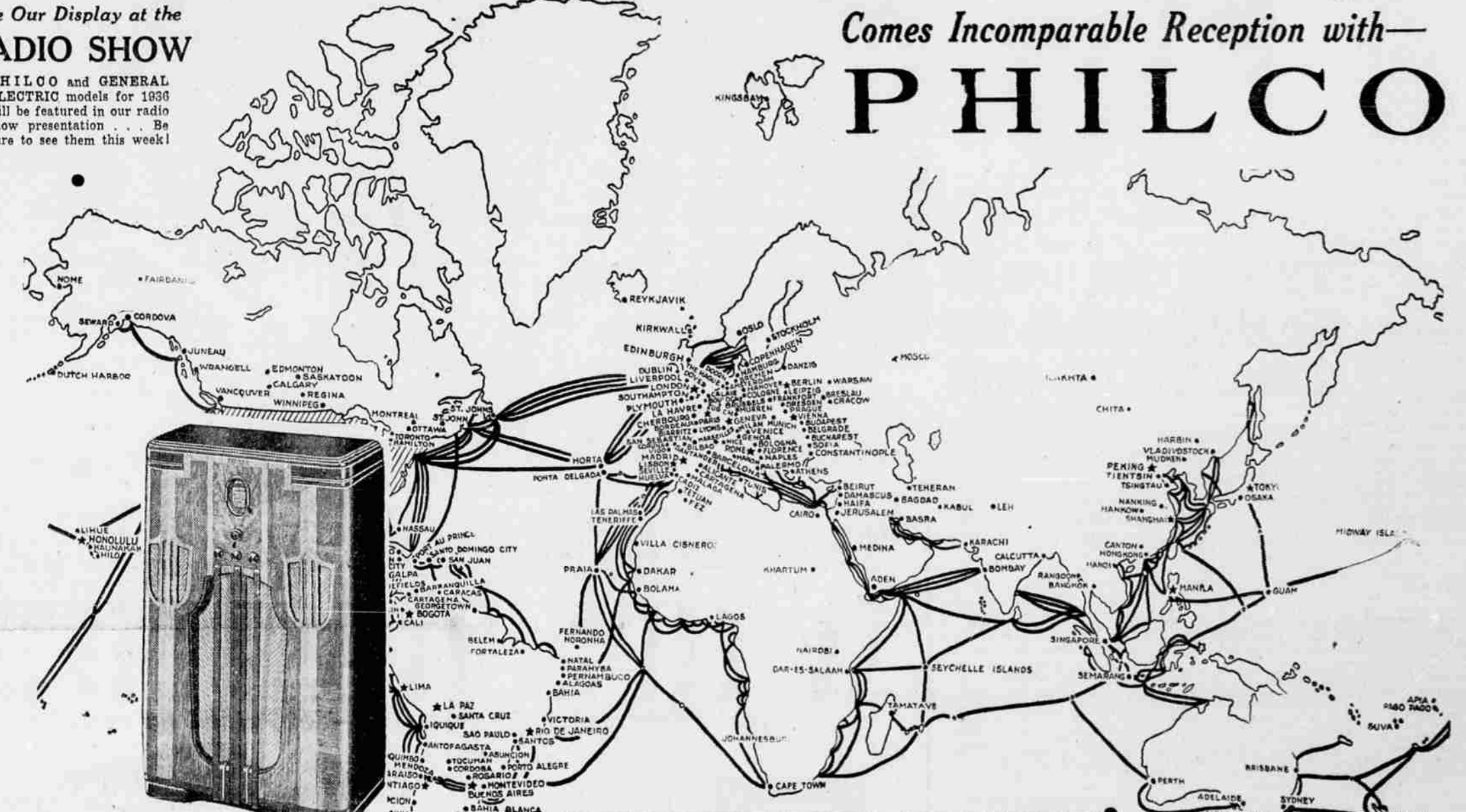

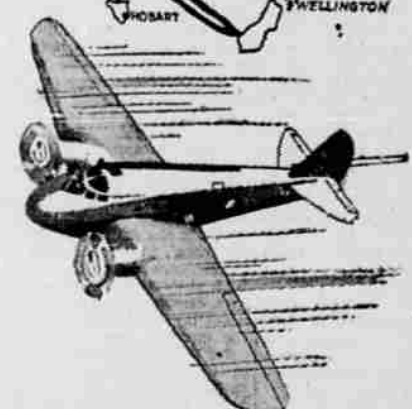
