EXTENT OF LONG'S WEALTH UNKNOWN TO HOME FRIENDS

BATON ROUGE, La., Sept. 11.—(AP)—Was Huey Long a millionaire, or, as he himself said, a man who had a pile of money but spent it for football trips, bands and political campaigns?

There was no one to answer the question today. That Long could and did make money was unquestioned.

Only a week ago, in a radio speech, the senator, telling how a New York hotel gave him a free room, said it wasn't because he couldn't pay.

Later, he modified that by saying he had plenty of money but spent it freely for his "boys" at Louisiana State university and for political work.

Some persons guessed he had as much as \$5,000,000. The more conservative would go no higher than \$2,250,000.

In recent months he collected large fees as attorney for the public service commission in reducing utility rates and as "back tax" collector for the state, receiving one third of all "back taxes" brought into the treasury.

A check of records showed he received \$225,000 from the tax commission and \$125,000 from the public service commission.

The federal government has been reported investigating Long's income for a number of years but no action was taken against him.

RENO GAMBLER IN SWINDLE COIN CUT ASSERTS WITNESS

NEW YORK, Sept. 11.—(AP)—Noble John Moore, one-time Canadian farm boy who turned confidence man, testified today that William J. Graham, Reno, Nevada gambler, took a 15 per cent "cut" from \$129,749 extortion money.

A government witness in the mail fraud and conspiracy trial of Graham and James C. McKay Moore, who is serving sentence for swindling, said he had "steered" four extortion victims to Reno.

After the victims sold securities through the Riverside Bank of Reno, Moore said, their money was taken by Graham, at one of his several night clubs.

Graham took 15 per cent from the loot, the witness declared, and returned the balance for division among the confidence men.

Moore said he had not been promised leniency by the government for testifying against the defendants.

Defense Attorney John T. Coe cross-examined the witness closely about this testimony. Moore insisted the government had promised him nothing.

Tate also quizzed Moore about his statement on direct examination that more than a decade ago he had been convicted "for living off" for taking the profits of a "bad woman."
