BUTTER INTERESTS EYE OUTSIDE MOUNT

PORTLAND, Sept. 12.—(AP)—Butter producers of the Portland area are watching the price advances in New York and Chicago with great interest. Local supplies are light, and the market is exceptionally firm. Production is expected to be stepped up this fall. There were no changes in butter or buttermilk.

Egg market is also firm, with receipts continuing light. No price change has occurred for several days. Demand for fresh goods is continuing excellent, with supplies scarce. Poultry prices are still firmer than either butter or eggs, with some slight advances having been reported earlier this week. An acute shortage has occurred on springs of all sizes.

Turkeys will start coming in early in October. No advance intimation can be gained as to the first quotations, but advices have come in that the flocks are sturdy and promise some fine birds for the holiday season.

SEATTLE, Sept. 12.—(UP)—Robert Van Peterson, 6-year-old Renton boy, died yesterday from rabies, developed from the bite of a neighbor's dog three weeks ago.

It was the first case of the disease reported in the state this year. There were two deaths last summer. The dog bit the boy in the face as he played with it, but was pronounced non-rabid by a veterinarian. Later it developed "spasms" and was shot. Robert was not given serum treatment until he became ill this week.
