The bride will wear pearl white georgette with a white veil, and will carry a shower bouquet of white roses, gardenias, and lilies of the valley. The veil is a gift to the bride from Hugh Storey, Sr., and was worn by Mrs. Storey at their wedding fifty-four years ago in Sheffield, England.

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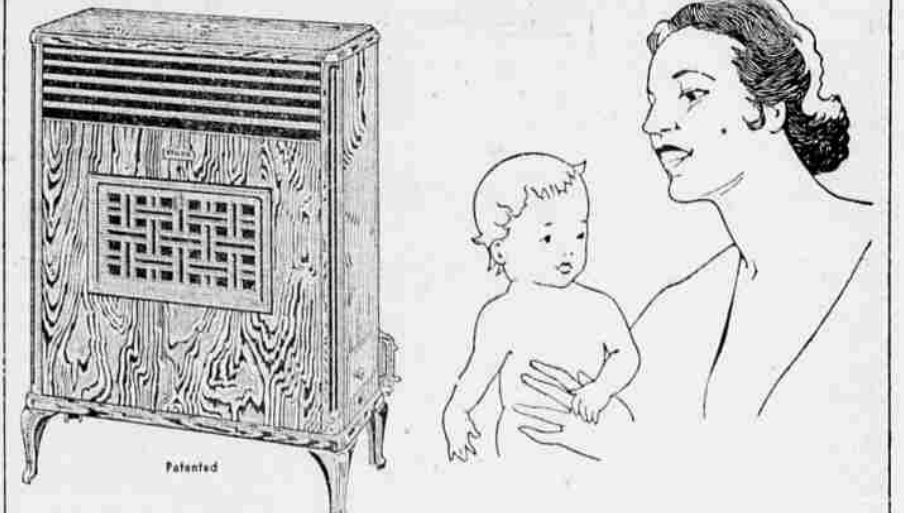
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
