For twenty-nine years the Apostolic Faith, with headquarters at Portland, Oregon, has maintained a place of worship in many cities where the general public, irrespective of class, color, or nationality, could gather to worship God according to the fullness of His Word. Hundreds have been converted from every walk in life and are giving marvelous testimonies of the great change that God has wrought in their lives.

Many of these cases have been considered incorrigible and incurable, some having been criminals and outcasts, others drug addicts, bound and fettered by the awful power of abnormal habit and appetite. On the other hand, many have come in contact with these meetings from the better walks of life, to whom the old-time religion made its appeal, and they, too, have experienced transformed lives. This work is carried on, and has progressed rapidly, without ever taking a collection or soliciting financial support from any outside source. The work is founded on the fundamental truths of the Word of God, and its doctrines are fearlessly preached by truth-loving ministers who have devoted their lives to the work of evangelism without fee or salary.

The headquarters, at Portland, is located in the heart of the city—a beautiful red-brick building, under a blazing neon sign, "Jesus the Light of the World," with a large star above it. Journalists have made much of this sign, and have called it Portland's guiding star.

The local branch of the Apostolic Faith, at 42 North Front street, has been established for a number of years. Seventeen workers came from the headquarters at Portland, to the Rogue River valley. A tent meeting was held first in Grants Pass, where many were converted. Then a tent meeting was held in Medford, at the close of which the Medford branch of the Apostolic Faith was established. Scores of men and women have been converted from all walks of life, in the Medford branch. The work is carried on here in the same style as at the headquarters. Scores—yes, many scores—gather at the time of service at the well-lighted, cheery downtown church on Front street, and enjoy the musical and singing as well as the spiritual testimonies and the preaching on the the fundamental truths of the Word of God. An orchestra accompanies the singing, and various vocal organizations sing special numbers. The local branch is in charge of D. L. Myers and George A. Seeley. The local workers are very progressive, and their zeal in spreading the old-time Gospel in every possible way is well known. CCC camps are visited, and meetings are held in many out-of-the-way places in the valley and out in the mountains, and workers visit hospitals and poor farms, even as far away as Yreka. Special meetings are going on now at Klamath Falls. Meetings are also held on the street just before the regular services.

Services are held at 7:45 on Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday nights, and at 10:30 and 7:30 on Sunday. The public is invited, and the usual Apostolic custom prevails—no collections.

"Chapel Moments," a program of music and song, is broadcast from the studio of the Apostolic Faith, at Sixth and Burnside, in Portland, at 9:00 o'clock on Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday evenings. And on Sunday afternoon at 2:30, a full Apostolic Service is broadcast. This is over KWJ (1040 Kilocycles).
