

MEXICAN YOUTH TO FACE TRIAL IN DOUGLAS CO.

Peter Chavez, 17, Mexican, who claims Stockton, Cal., as his home, and to be a California reform school escape, held in the county jail on a charge of beating and robbing John Slater, 51, transient, and casting Slater unconscious into the ice compartment of an express refrigerator car last Saturday, will be turned over to the Douglas county authorities for trial, the district attorney said today.

As close checkup of Chavez' story indicates that the assault took place in that county, near Roseburg. Chavez and Slater, with an unidentified youth, were "stealing a ride" on the southbound Southern Pacific passenger train, according to a statement to the state police. At Eugene, Chavez says he picked up a railroad tie spike, and planned to rob Slater. While the train was speeding through the hills, Chavez is alleged to have struck Slater on the head, rendering him unconscious, robbing him of three pennies, and then with the assistance of the unidentified youth, lowering Slater into the ice bunker and closing the hatch. The trio were riding on top of the refrigerator car. Slater regained consciousness while the passenger train was at the local depot, and his cries resulted in his rescue by the train crew. Slater gave a good description of his assailant, and Chavez was arrested in the local road yard a short time later. Chavez is alleged to have admitted the robbery attempt, according to state police, but denied "hitting Slater hard."

DETECTIVE HELD AS WIFE SLAYER

NEW YORK, Sept. 15.—(AP)—Detective Daniel Sullivan, veteran of 18 years on the New York police force, was held without bail today on a charge of homicide for slaying his wife and seriously wounding his 14-year-old daughter.

Deputy Chief Inspector John J. Ryan said that Sullivan admitted shooting his wife, Helen, 38, and wounding Evelyn, one of their five children, when she attempted to aid her mother at their Brooklyn home yesterday.

Police said that the other children told them that the quarrel started when their mother came home in the early morning hours after a night at Coney Island.

Horse Methuselah Celebrates 39th Year Hale, Hearty

HALIFAX, N. S., Sept. 15.—(UP)—Harry, dean of Nova Scotia equines and the "oldest horse in the world," celebrated his 39th birthday today.

So far as Halifaxians are concerned that's a world's record and will continue to be unless someone pops up with conclusive evidence to the contrary. Harry observed the occasion by nibbling an extra portion of oats.

He is owned by a firm of spar and car makers and still knocks off a day's work now and then just to show the citizens that his teeth are every bit as good as his years are every bit as good as those of a youngster of 20.

The equine Methuselah was purchased by his present owners back in 1900 when he was four.

Franklin C. Hoyt of New Hamburg, N. Y., to head the new bureau in the treasury for federal control of alcohol.

BULLET IN BRAIN LEAVES NO INJURY

TOLEDO.—(UP)—Unmindful of the fact that she is a source of wonder to physicians because of a bullet in the base of her skull, Barbara Lois Lamont frolics just as her other five-year-old playmates do.

Since last September a small-caliber bullet has been lodged in the mastoid bone just behind her left ear, chatting with her neighborhood playmates, when the bullet struck from an unknown source. It entered Barbara's brain above her right temple, on a downward course.

Apparently more frightened by blood than hurt, she was taken to a hospital. Doctors gave her six hours to live. Her chance for recovery was set at one in 1000.

But after a few days Barbara was sent home. The fear that the child might develop signs of falling health or mentality has vanished. Next September she will be enrolled in the first grade.

Doctors say there appears to be no need for an operation to remove the bullet. Mrs. William Lamont, the child's mother, said.

Barbara is bright-eyed and alert, and normal in every other respect.

ANCIENT VIKING BOAT DISCOVERED IN SWEDEN

UPPSALA, Sweden.—(UP)—A 1000-year-old Viking boat, containing the skeletons of a woman, a horse and a dog, has been unearthed in a boat grave near here, and according to archeologists of Uppsala university is the best preserved find of its kind ever made in Sweden.

In addition to the skeletons the boat contained finely carved wooden vessels, food, a ring of gold wire, a steering oar and ballast. The horse and dog had been killed before their burial, archeologists say, to accompany the woman on her last journey.

Hongkong Bank Fails To Open

HONGKONG, Sept. 15.—(AP)—The Chinese National Commercial Savings bank, which is associated with prominent Chinese department stores, failed to open today.

It had been experiencing a run since the Bank of Canton's suspension September 5. Officials said the difficulties were due to a drain on deposits combined with frozen assets.

RACKETEERS FIND WAY TO PREY UPON KINFOLK OF DEAD

CHICAGO.—(UP)—Racketeers have found a way to cash in on death.

The "Memorial scroll" racket, a ghouliah ruse in which confidence men plan months in advance to extract a "fin" or "sawbuck" (\$5 or \$10) from dazed relatives of the deceased, is handled this way:

Calling themselves the "Institute of Brotherly Love," "The Arm-Around-the-Neck Foundation," or by some such name, the racketeers circulate a list of clergymen for the nation.

They ask clergymen for expressions of opinion regarding a plan to promote good will among Protestants, Jews, Catholics and other faiths. In many cases, and in good faith, the clergymen answer.

After several months have passed, the racketeers notice that someone is dead in Cleveland and that some rabbi is mentioned in connection with funeral services, or that a prominent physician is dead in Minneapolis and that a minister whose name is on their list to preach the services.

A letter is written, along this line: "The deceased was a member of the Institute of Brotherly Love. It is the custom of the institute upon the death of a member to send his surviving kin a Memorial Scroll that can be treasured for years."

The Institute in a postscript, says it will be glad to send the scroll for \$10.

Many of the survivors want some token to remember the deceased by, and readily agree on a memorial scroll showing that he preached tolerance and good will in life. A \$10-bill, under the circumstances, is large and consequently the racketeers profit by about \$9.50.

There are other con games designed to prey on relatives of the deceased, including the C.O.D. package containing a fountain pen on which the dead man allegedly paid a \$1 deposit always center on the dead.

There is the "stuffed flat" racket in which an apartment is filled with ancient furniture purchased cheaply from a storage house and a published announcement made that the owner leaves town and sell his goods at a sacrifice.

MARINE INSURANCE REFLECTS WAR HINT

LONDON, Sept. 15.—(AP)—Marine underwriters decided today, in view of the Italo-Ethiopian situation, to give notice that ships and cargo transiting the Mediterranean and the Suez canal must be insured separately against war risks or be included in ordinary insurance contracts at special premiums.

Contracts for marine insurance normally provide coverage against war risks, but a clause allows the insurer to exclude war risks by giving 10 days notice.

To Extradite Two SALEM, Sept. 15.—(AP)—Governor Miles authorized that extradition today of Earl Stewart, wanted in San Francisco for grand theft, and Howard Jacobson, wanted in Wisconsin for abandoning his wife and two children. Stewart was arrested in Josephine county, and Jacobson in Portland.

Rare Gold Cross Found. ERIVAN, Armenia.—(UP)—A gold cross weighing 18 grams was discovered near the Dvin village, which was the capital of Armenia from the 6th to the 9th centuries. This cross, the only one of its kind, is set with a Sasanid carved gem bearing the image of a bird.
