

ASHLAND NORMAL ENROLLMENT WILL HIT HIGHER LEVEL

Prediction Based On Increase in Inquiries—Low Costs to Student Proves Attraction for Many

All indications point to a large increase in enrollment at the Southern Oregon State Normal school this fall. This predicted increase in enrollment is based upon the large number of inquiries that have been received by the registrar, which far exceeds the number received during the corresponding period for several years past.

The most basic and most important reason for this increase is probably the general renewed interest in higher education on the part of young people coupled with the opportunity to secure financial aid through the national youth administration.

Specific attractions at the Southern Oregon State Normal school for young men and young women in southern Oregon are the opportunity to take lower division work leading to the junior certificate and the low cost to the student at this institution.

Last year the state board of higher education of Oregon authorized the addition of a lower division curriculum at this school in order that additional educational opportunities might be extended to the young people of southern Oregon who do not care to take up teaching as a profession.

Credits earned in this lower division curriculum may be transferred to four years of higher education and applied toward graduation from those schools and departments whose requirements for graduation correspond to the offerings in this curriculum. Students who have decided upon the college course they wish to take can, with the advice and suggestions of registering officials, select subjects which will transfer credit for credit to four-year institutions of higher learning.

Tuition and other school costs are very moderate. Board and room can be secured for from \$18 to \$24 per month. Students who do not care to live in the dormitories can secure housekeeping accommodations for a very moderate sum and cut the cost per month to as low as \$12 to \$15, or even lower if food can be brought from home.

The splendid placement record of the school is another attraction of the Southern Oregon State Normal school to those who wish to prepare for teaching in the elementary schools of Oregon. Over 85 per cent of the 1934 graduating class was placed in teaching positions. Of the 1935 graduating class of 78 but 9 are without positions and in all probability these people will be placed by the first of October.

PORTLAND BRIDE TAKES OWN LIFE

PORTLAND, Sept. 17.—(AP)—The death of a young wife last night from a gunshot wound was described by the coroner's office today as a suicide after discovery of a note which told of her plan to end her life. The girl was Mrs. Jesse Nelson, 19 years old.

Patrolman Collie Stoops said she and her husband, Glenn, 23, had quarreled bitterly for several weeks. Nelson told Stoops the quarrel continued all day Sunday; that after retiring last night she exclaimed "I'm going to shoot myself," and ran from the room. A moment later the shot was fired.

The Nelsons had been married 18 months.

COAL ACT INJUNCTION DENIED BY U. S. COURT

WASHINGTON, Sept. 17.—(AP)—Justice Daniel W. O'Donoghue of the District of Columbia supreme court today denied a temporary injunction against enforcement of the Guffey coal stabilization act.

That represented a victory for the government.

Holmes announced his resignation as pastor of one Church of the Nazarene here to his congregation Sunday night, and will become pastor of the same church in Oregon City. His resignation here, accepted with regret by the church, will become effective on or before October 15.

The Rev. Holmes will take the place in Oregon City of the Rev. Ralph Cook, who is selling with his wife for missionary work in India.

G-MEN WILL HUNT PEDDLERS OF LOOT

WASHINGTON, Sept. 17.—(AP)—J. Edgar Hoover, director of the bureau of investigation, today announced a nationwide investigation of alleged connections between "fences" who deal in stolen property and insurance companies and insurance adjusters.

Trafficking in stolen jewelry was mentioned particularly in the announcement. Hoover said, however, that his investigation was not a result of the recent Scarfa investigation in New York. The probe had been contemplated for some months, he said.

"We are going to prosecute those who are protecting these traffickers in stolen goods," Mr. Hoover declared.

CCC PISTOL AGES TO VIE FOR BEER

CAMP WIMER.—(Sp.)—A feud of long standing between the military and technical staffs of CCC Camp Wimer will be settled with pistols here this afternoon. Beginning with an argument over the relative merits of various makes of guns, the difference of opinion between Captain Guy W. Saunders and Chief Foreman Paul Thompson rapidly involved staff members, until it became apparent that definite settlement could not be reached without shooting it out.

A match has been arranged with .22 caliber pistols at regular pistol targets 20 paces distant. Each of four army men and four technical men will shoot 20 rounds, total aggregate score to determine the winner. A case of beer will go to the winners from the losers.

Some fear has been expressed here that foreign nations may visualize a state of unpreparedness in the U. S. in case the foresters beat the army shooting.

G-MEN'S CHIEF DENIES MAHAN FORGED PAROLE

WASHINGTON, Sept. 17.—(AP)—J. Edgar Hoover, director of the bureau of investigation, today denied reports that William Mahan, Weyerhaeuser kidnapping fugitive, had once been released from the Idaho state prison on a forged parole recommendation.

"There's not a word of truth in it," the chief of the "G-men" said.

Monarch Seed Is Given Publicity Magazine Article

Medford and southern Oregon received widespread publicity in the September issue of The Grain and Feed Review, a national publication for seed and feed dealers, which devoted two pages to the advertising methods used by the Monarch Seed and Feed Co. to increase feed business.

Pictures of Raymond and Robert Miksche occupied prominent places in the story. The magazine described Medford as "a lively, progressive city, a center of business in southwestern Oregon. Surrounding are good farms and orchards, some aggressive dairy farmers and poultrymen."

FORTMILLER NEW CHAMBER LEADER

ASHLAND, Sept. 17.—(Sp.)—Charles W. Fortmiller of Fortmiller's department store was automatically chosen president of the Ashland chamber of commerce at a luncheon meeting of the board of directors at the Ashland hotel Monday noon.

Fortmiller, vice-president of the organization since March, 1934, will fill the unexpired term of Dr. Bernard G. Barkwill, who officially resigned at the same meeting. A new president will be chosen next March.

It was first thought necessary to elect a president to serve out the term until the next regular election, but no specific provision in the chamber's constitution appeared to cover the exigency and the directors voted to promote the vice-president.

Election of another member of the board to fill Dr. Barkwill's place, will occur at the next regular meeting of the directors, on Monday, September 30. Dr. Barkwill will end his practice as a physician here on October 1 and will depart for the east where he will study at the University of Pennsylvania.

HANEY TAKES OATH AS FEDERAL JUDGE

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 17.—(AP)—The solemn ritual of the August United States circuit court of appeals was invoked here Monday as Bert E. Haney of Portland was sworn in as an associate justice of that federal court.

Haney, former member of the United States shipping board, was appointed last month. He is a Democrat.

AGED MAN DESTROYS LIFETIME SAVINGS

TERUEL, Spain, Sept. 17.—(UP)—Raimon Benes, an aged man called "The King" in the village of El Pobo, today went to the hiding place of his life savings—30,000 pesetas (almost \$3000) and, while his heirs gaped, calmly touched a match to a jar filled with silver coins into a well. "I did it," said "The King," "so that no one would enjoy an income from the sweat of my brow."

PLEASURES OF SIN NOT SUBSTANTIAL PASTORS WARNING

Speaking Sunday night at the Nazarene church on "How Happiness is Changed and Sustained," Fred M. Weatherford, pastor-evangelist, said in part:

"You will find my text in Hebrews 11:25, 'The Pleasures of Sin,' also Romans 14:17, 'The Kingdom of God is not meat and drink, but righteousness, and peace, and joy in the Holy Ghost.'"

"The motivating principle of sin is selfishness. It was this principle by which sin was inaugurated in the world. The natural man wants to be self-seeking, self-gratified and self-indulgent. He rebels against any infringement or encroachments against a free hand."

"The pleasures of sin are of short duration; they are like broken cisterns—full at night and empty in the morning. They are like the attractions of crackling thorns in a blaze—the flash is but momentary. Take the sin of alcoholic indulgence for instance—the young man stands at the bar hesitating to drink the beer that has been served. Suddenly he resolves to take it by saying 'there is no harm in beer.' An old, grizzled, emaciated form, seated at the table with a glass of beer in his hands, hearing the young man's statement, said, 'That's what they told me when I started out.'"

"The story of Henry H. Rogers, as appeared in Friday's paper, in which was featured a gin party, with himself, chauffeur and an actress, is becoming all too frequent in American life. The outcome of that story was a dead actress, resulting from a bullet."

"The late Knute Rockne once said 'A player should abstain absolutely from poison, such as alcohol.' Connie Mack said, 'I wouldn't bother with a youngster who drinks; alcohol is a preventive of the clean living and quick thinking that leads to success.' Eugene Tunney said, 'I have never used tobacco or liquor.'"

"Sin is a snare that costs more than it is labeled. It offers the glare and the thrill, but its fruits are a guilty conscience, a robbed mind, broken health, and a physical wreck abandoned by God, to the darkness of eternity."

"A man who has been dismantled by the storms of sin and has passed by the last ship to offer rescue is set adrift on eternity's merciless forever."

"There is a brighter side—that man who invites Christ to become King over his life has subscribed to the fruits of righteousness, peace and joy. He also has the glory of an immortal reward; at the end of life's journey he will have said of him, 'Enter thou into the joy of thy Lord.' In the words of Paul he may say, 'I have finished the course; I have kept the faith; henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness which the Lord, the righteous Judge, shall give me in that day.' The duration of such blessing shall be forever."

JUSTICE BY SORCERY FAILS, SOVIET JUDGE EXPELLED BY PARTY

ARTEMOVSK, U. S. S. R.—(UP)—Even Solomon's methods of judgment sometimes go awry, as the director of the dining-room of a local factory can testify.

It will be recalled that Solomon, asked to decide which of two claiming mothers a child belonged, proposed to cut it in half and give each a portion. The real mother dissented in terror, and received the child.

The Artemovsk director's problem was vastly different, but he employed the same psychology, drawing on eastern sorcery.

A dining-room waitress said her money had been stolen by a fellow employe. The director ordered all workers, one by one, to pass through a dark room in which was a soot-dipped cat. Each was instructed to pat the animal, while secretly an attendant was placed at the exit to examine the hands of all. The guilty person, so the director thought, would be afraid to touch the cat and his clean hands would signify his guilt.

Most of the workers, disgusted with what they considered sheer foolishness, passed through the room without touching the cat. Moreover, they complained to higher officials about the incident.

Not only did the sorcery-steeped director fail to catch his thief. He also was expelled from the Communist party.
