BURNED FOREST AREAS OPEN TO DEER HUNTERS SAYS GAME SUPERVISOR

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 17.—(UP)—Supervisor Frank Wire of the Oregon State game commission last night said that 310,000 acres swept by Oregon's greatest forest fire in August, 1933, will be open to deer hunters this season. The great Tillamook burn, encompassing the watersheds of the Trask and Wilson rivers, Scoggins creek and other streams, mostly on the western slope of the Coast range, will be open after a two year closure to hunting. Wire said reports were that many deer had returned to the burn and hunting would be good, especially around the fringes. It was not believed many deer had penetrated to the center of the razed area. Feed for deer is plentiful and hunting will be much easier than formerly, because of destruction of brush by fire. The deer season opens next Sunday. Wire emphasized that only deer with bucked horns may be shot because bucks and does are taboo, due to a persistent rumor to the contrary. State Forester Lynn P. Cronmiller said at Salem that return of dry weather indicated many forests would not be reforested until it rains more. This will not prevent deer hunting in
