

STATE DELETES MOONEY'S VIEWS ON REVOLUTION

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move that all the questions asked on cross examination yesterday and the answers given, be stricken from the record.

Quizzed on Arrest

The reversal of the state's tactics in cross examination was followed by questions concerning Mooney's arrest at Guerneville, Calif., where he was vacationing five days after the bombing.

Through answers to a series of questions he told of being accused by Captain James F. Brennan of being implicated in the bombing and of the police grilling in San Francisco. Then Mooney told of efforts to organize employees of the United railways here.

"But when Charles M. Pickert (district attorney who prosecuted Mooney) ran for office he was backed by the United railways," he said.

Walsh and Cleary stipulated that the record of Mooney's original trial disclosed no witness, except John McDonald and Frank Oxman, had testified that Mooney was seen at the scene of the explosion.

Mooney testified he had been given permission by W. D. Mahon, then president of the Amalgamated Street Railways Employees union to organize the workers. Subsequently, he said, he was given \$250 to aid in the organizing.

Letter Refutes Claim

Cleary then handed Mooney a letter, written by the prisoner to a friend, and dated several months after the time Mooney said he had received permission from Mahon. In the letter Mooney had asked the friend to intercede with Mahon to enable him to get permission for the organization work.

After spending some time reading the letter, Mooney said he had written it.

"After 19 years it has taken me some time to remember the facts of the case," he said, "this letter as well as others were taken by Martin Swanson and the other farmers. The date of this letter has been tampered with. But I now remember it was some time later than I testified a few minutes ago and it was after this letter was written that I was given permission by Mahon to do the organizing work."

BIG PORTLAND MILL RESUMES OPERATION

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 19.—(AP)—The Big Eastern & Western Lumber company mill here, closed since May 8, resumed operations today with about 400 men included in the return to work program.

No production had been attempted since May 3 when workers walked out in advance of the general northwest lumber strike. The company revealed yesterday that an agreement had been reached with workers; that former employees are returning and that pickets have been withdrawn.

RAILROADS ASSURE PROPER RIPENING OF BOSCS IN EAST

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Dr. Hartman reached the conclusion that in order to re-establish the popularity of the pears, it was necessary, when the cold months come, beginning with the latter part of October and through November and December, to place the pears in warmer rooms, thus starting them towards ripening.

When by many tests and experiments, by Dr. Hartman, the ripening shed program was demonstrated as feasible and practical, the Rogue River Traffic association, acting for the shippers and growers, became active in a program to secure ripening facilities in the eastern markets.

The railroads at first were not willing to accept the plan, claiming that their own investigations showed the project was too large, and the cost too high to warrant establishment of the service. In view of the tonnage involved, the feasibility of

the plan, after a long period, was made convincing, and the railroads agreed to inaugurate the service.

RODEO IS OPEN TO LOCAL RIDERS

A bid is going to be made by the American Legion rodeo committee to have as many local riders and horses in the rodeo which opens here Saturday, as possible. A prize of \$25 has been offered by Norman Cowan for the meanest and wildest local nag in the show, and free barns and feed for the cattle will be furnished, it was announced today.

Interest in the event is growing daily, and a large crowd is anticipated. Such riders as Clay Carr, who has won championships in this country and in Australia, Perry Ivory, several times coast champ, Leonard Wood, coast champ last year, and many others will come here, many directly from the Pendleton round-up and the state fair.

Hugh Stockland, veteran rodeo showman, will be here with his steeplechase cow pony "Dimingo." Stockland, the best known cowboy in the west, has performed and won fame at Pendleton, Fort Worth, Cheyenne, Madison, and in England.

There will also be an impressive array of feminine rodeo stars, headed by Miss Parra, champion all around cow-girl of Canada last year.

British Faces Crisis

Within Great Britain, a political party crisis was precipitated by the government attitude that the League of Nations covenant must be upheld.

Heads of the labor party were convoked in an "emergency meeting" on the question of whether Lord Ponsonby and George Lansbury, the party's leaders in the houses of lords and commons, should be permitted to quit their posts because of their pacifism in view of the fact that the trades union council and the party endorsed the application of sanctions against an aggressor nation.

The Ethiopian government was stated by an adviser to Emperor Haile Selassie as considering it had done everything possible to avert war and that from now on the question of peace rested with Italy.

Suggest Settlement

The Italo-Ethiopian committee of the League of Nations prepared a report suggesting the controversy between Italy and Ethiopia could be settled by the appointment of foreign specialists, to be approved by Emperor Haile Selassie, to supervise police and other functions of the Ethiopian government.

An Italian government spokesman said this report gave no occasion "for Italy to change her attitude of pessimism or skepticism."

The war scare had world-wide repercussions which included a stock exchange boom in Tokyo and public manifestations of sympathy for Ethiopia.

Commenting on the situation, the noted British dramatist, John Drinkwater, suggested the statement of the League of Nations "emulate Abraham Lincoln by following a steadfast and perfectly strong course of action, yet keeping a perfectly open mind."

\$7,550,000 ALLOTTED FOR BONNEVILLE DAM

WASHINGTON, Sept. 19.—(AP)—The war department today allotted \$7,550,000 for rivers and harbors work from funds authorized in the second deficiency act.

An allotment of \$7,550,000 was made for continuing construction operations now in progress at the Bonneville dam in the Columbia river in Oregon.

Most of the funds allotted to Bonneville are for construction of a power house, fishway, railroad and highway, and for the acquisition of reservoir lands.

Equine Methuselah Has Strong Rival On Sardine Creek

The rival for old-age honors is Buck, 29-year-old mare owned by Fred McFarlane and when Buck heard a discussion about Harry, way off in Nova Scotia, she whinnied as much to say: "Huh, ten years from now I'll be just as spry as I am today. I'll show Mr. Harry how long a real horse can live."

FORD UNINTERESTED IN POLITICS; FEELS PROSPERITY COMING

DETROIT, Sept. 19.—(AP)—Henry Ford said in an interview published today in the Detroit News that he is not interested in any "Ford for president" boom, or in politics generally.

Discussing the business outlook, the motor magnate said:

"I am not a prophet but I have the feeling that business and wage trends will be up and I do not believe the political campaign of next year will have any appreciable effect on business, one way or the other."

Ford reiterated his aversion to the role and said work is the panacea for hard times.

"When people start to work at something their condition is bound to improve, and nothing but work will do it. Stop the dole and more work will begin. Most of the people hate a handout. They want work."

Ford said sales of his cars had increased all over the country, and among all classes of buyers. He declined to predict Ford production in 1936, but pointed out that his forecast of a million cars in 1935 virtually had been fulfilled, 966,104 Ford cars having been built.

There will be no basic changes in the new models, production of which is scheduled to start Oct. 1, Ford said.

WALLACE RESIGNS GAME COMMISSION TO REMAIN SOLO

PORTLAND, Sept. 19.—(AP)—Determined that he shall not be replaced as a member of the house of representatives from Multnomah county, Lew Wallace of Portland today had quit the state game commission membership on which had caused him to be ruled ineligible as a legislator.

Wallace's action followed by a few hours the appointment of three Portland Republicans to succeed Multnomah Democrats who, because of accepting other lucrative state or federal offices, had been declared ineligible to continue in the senate or the house.

"I will appear at Salem with my certificate of election issued by the secretary of state and will ask for my seat," Wallace declared. The county commission has appointed Robert S. Farrell Jr. to succeed him.

Wallace said he will carry his battle to the floor of the house at the forthcoming special session of the legislature.

SALEM, Sept. 19.—(AP)—Secretary of State Snell today set Monday, September 23, as date for the Douglas county court to meet and choose a successor to William Knight, Douglas county state representative, whose letter of resignation was received here today.

It was expected the court at the same time would select a successor to Senator Walter Fisher, who was declared ineligible to hold his position after he was appointed to the World War Veterans state air commission. Fisher later resigned from the commission and it was thought probable he would be named to succeed himself.

PENDLETON, Ore., Sept. 19.—(AP)—Opposition to establishment of a Columbia valley authority at this time was expressed by Judge Calvin L. Sweek of Pendleton at a hearing here yesterday. Sweek is president of the Inland Empire Waterways association.
