

3,500,000 JOBS BY NOVEMBER 1 IS GOAL OF WPA

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20.—(AP)—Harry L. Hopkins, works progress administrator, said today at his press conference he expected the works program to reach its goal of providing 3,500,000 jobs and ending direct relief by November 1.

"Our schedule provides for our putting these people to work," he said. "On the assumption we will put them to work, we will end direct relief November 1."

Hopkins added that, including CCC workers, 931,703 individuals have been given jobs under the works program. That leaves 2,498,297 to be taken care of in the next six weeks if the November 1 deadline is to be attained.

The administrator also announced an executive order had been issued giving state administrators the right to fix minimum hours of work under the program.

His only explanation was that this seemed desirable from an administrative standpoint. He said, however, in response to questions that this would make it possible for the security wage rate to fall in line with prevailing wages through hour reductions, although the security wage will remain unchanged.

BERRIES IN BARRELS KEPT WITHOUT COLD UNDER NEW FORMULA

SALEM, Sept. 20.—(AP)—Discovery of a formula whereby berries may be barreled and kept indefinitely without use of cold storage or refrigeration was announced here today by Max Gehlar, former state director of agriculture now operating a cannery in West Salem.

Gehlar declared that logberries packed under this formula, which he said was secret, in his warehouse over two months ago, and kept under normal weather conditions, were in as good condition as the day they were packed.

Although ingredients used in the preparation bleach the berries a nearly white, their original color is returned in less than two minutes when heat is applied, Gehlar said.

The former agricultural director stated arrangements had been completed with 12 jam manufacturing plants in different parts of the United States to put his new formula to a test this year.

VFW SEEKS PROBE SCRAP IRON SALES

NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 20.—(AP)—The 30th annual encampment of veterans of foreign wars adopted a resolution today asking congress to investigate shipments of scrap iron from the United States so it "will not be used to play the youth of America should there be another war."

The resolution, submitted by the department of Massachusetts, asked congress to provide statutes to investigate shipments, "particularly to Japan," to discover whether they are being used for munitions manufacture.

The usage of metal shipped from this country to other countries should be "unquestionably ascertained," the resolution said.

COCKTAIL COLLEGE TO BE GIVEN EYE

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 20.—(AP)—Portland's cocktail college, self-styled school of "mixology," will be investigated thoroughly to see if the "curriculum" conforms with Oregon's liquor laws Mayor Joseph Carson announced today.

"I'm going to lower the boom on that place," the mayor said.

The place came into existence a day or so ago, with announcement that courses of training in mixing drinks would be given. Twenty-five cents is the "instructor's" charge and disposition of the finished product is left up to the "student."

NAVY WILL HAVE SCHOOL OF MUSIC

Establishment of a Navy School of Music has been announced by the United States Bureau of Navigation at Washington, D. C., recently, with applicants being accepted through regular enlistment channels. The officer in charge of the school is to be the leader of the United States Navy Band and will personally supervise the instruction.

Length of the course in this school the first of its kind, has been designed as two years, except for the first class to enter, and the quota of students detailed to the school will be 40 per year.

NOTHING DEFINITE ON BOYER MAKING CHANGE

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 20.—(AP)—Dr. C. V. Boyer, president of University of Oregon, said here today no definite decision had been reached on the suggestion that he become president of the State University of Montana.

LOG CRUSHES WORKER IN CALIFORNIA WOODS

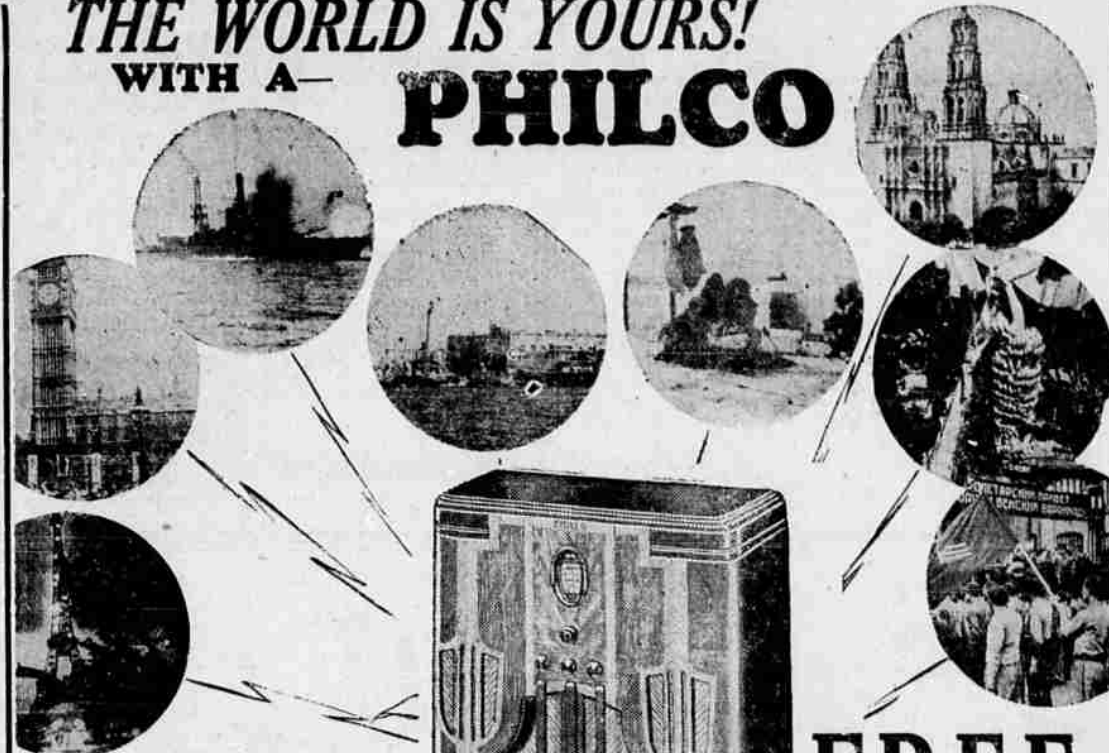

LA GRANDE, Ore., Sept. 20.—(AP)—Union county's prune harvest will start next Monday with growers on the whole looking forward to an excellent season.

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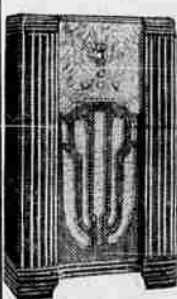
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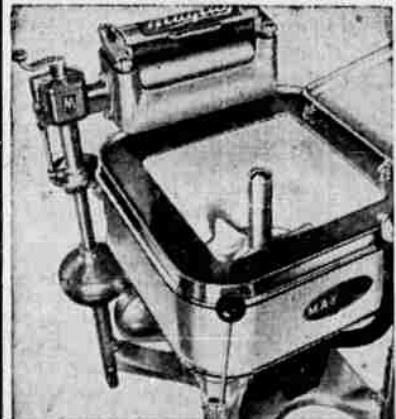
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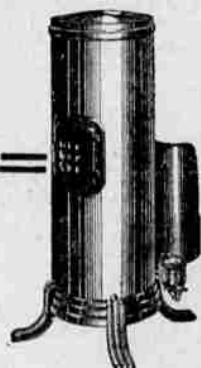
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
