

VENISON SEEKERS MAKING READY IN CENTRAL OREGON

BEND, Ore., Sept. 20.—(P)—Red-hatted hunters from Pacific coast states were converging here today, en route to favored camping sites in the central Oregon forests, preparatory to the opening of the deer hunting season Sunday morning.

The advance guard of venison seekers in the Deschutes, Fremont, Ochoco and Malheur woods indicated a record number of hunters would be in mid-state forests Sunday.

Opening of the season on Sunday enabling hunters to do week-end stalking, and the opening of the Murders creek game refuge in the John Day district, contributed to the increase.

Boundaries of the John Day area preserve have been shifted considerably this year and Don H. Peoples, secretary of the Deschutes Sportsmen's association, advised hunters to acquaint themselves with new lines.

Unless a storm moves in before the week-end, hunters will find central Oregon woods abnormally dry, forest officials said. Less than six inches of moisture have fallen this year in the mid-state country.

Stockmen and foresters report there are plenty of deer in the central Oregon forests this season.

ELECTRICAL CONTROL OF CROPS VISION OF WESTINGHOUSE HEAD

NEW YORK, Sept. 20.—(P)—Crop control by electricity was forecast today by Dr. S. M. Kintner, vice-president of the Westinghouse company, in a talk before the advertising club of New York.

"The possibilities," he said, "appear almost limitless. In addition to the usual applications of power and light, much can be expected from the control of insects that now infest grains and plants."

"The seeds that are now carrying these menaces will be freed and given better opportunity for their start in life."

"What will be the effect on plant growth of these new uses of radiation? No one can tell without extended trials. The treatments of some kinds of radiations like x-rays are known to influence the plants' characteristics to such an extent that new varieties are thereby created."

"One need go but a step more to imagine conditions of selection by some such means that would permit of destroying the undesired weeds and thus render available all the food wasted by weeds."

"Isn't it readily conceivable that in the preparation of the soil for planting, by some electrical treatment, it could be rendered free from seeds of weeds and thus greatly reduce the labor and expense of subsequent care of crops?"

HOBSON TELLS VETS AMERICA WILL WAR WITH WHOLE WORLD

SAN ANTONIO, Sept. 20.—(P)—Rear-Admiral Richmond Pearson Hobson, an outstanding hero of the Spanish-American war, in a prophetic speech today before the assembly of the annual United Spanish War Veterans' encampment, declared he foresees the United States in armed struggle with the autocratic forces of the world.

The admiral said the struggle will be between autocracy as represented by communism, fascism and imperialism, against constitutional democracy, as represented by the United States.

"They will give no quarter, and we likewise shall give none," he declared.

He urged that the United States prepare for such a struggle.

"America should first control the air and sea from the mid-Atlantic to the mid-Pacific ocean," he said. "And we should iron out all internal difficulties."

He urged that labor and capital settle all their disputes, "so we can go into the production of great wealth which will be a weapon in our battle with communism and state socialism."

"Germany, Italy and Russia, with millions of men, are ready for war," he said. "We are almost totally unprepared."

COUNTY OFFICES DRAFT BUDGETS

County offices and departments are now compiling their budgets for the coming year, for submission to the budget committee, composed of M. B. Chase, Table Rock district orchardist, J. W. McCoy, Ashland banker, and H. A. Thierolf, Medford lumberman, who with the county court will compile the 1936 budget.

All appointive members of the budget committee are known as conservative business men.

The first budget meeting is scheduled to be called October 2, but County Judge Day plans to have sessions before that date, so the budget committee can get a "true picture of Jackson county finances and needs."

The budget, under Oregon law, must be in the hands of the assessor by November 6, and it is expected that the public hearing on the budget, will be a week or ten days before that date.

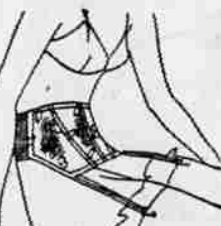

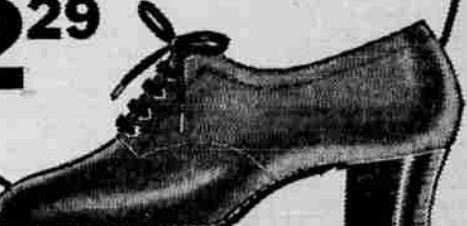

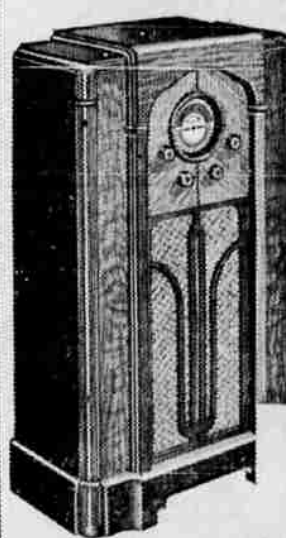
