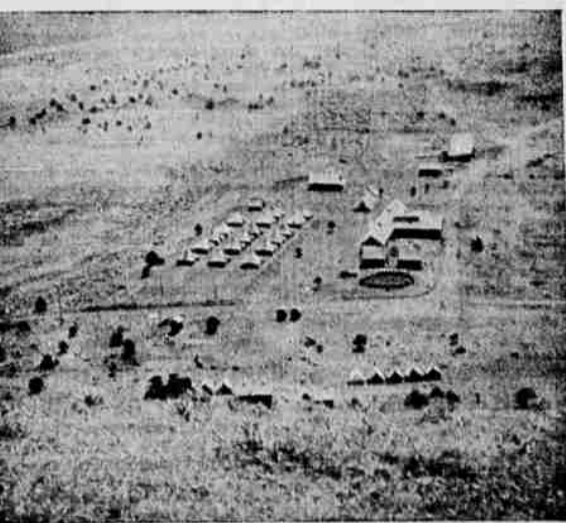

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Lava Beds Camp Located On Historic Battlefield



Here is Camp Lava Beds, built up on the ground that was once a bloody battlefield for one of the many fights between the U. S. Cavalry and the Modoc Indians. The cleanly pulled grounds, neat, orderly tents and new buildings give the visitor a splendid impression of the camp. It is located amid the Lava Beds of northern California near the Oregon state line.

By JAME KITHREDGE, Lava Beds, where one of the bloodiest Indian wars in American history was waged, now stands the headquarters company 1989, Camp Lava Beds. The camp itself is built upon ground that was the scene of one of the many battles of the Modoc war of 1872-73. Within a few miles of the camp is Captain Jack's stronghold, where the Indian band of 71 held out for five months against superior white forces and where over 100 white soldiers were killed, with no loss of life to the Indians. There, too, is Captain's cross, erected by his soldiers in memory of General E. R. S. Canby, killed by the Indians on that spot, April 11, 1873. Many members of the company have found arrowheads made of obsidian (volcanic glass) along the onetime lake shore and in the camp itself.

The most interesting attraction of the Lava Beds country is the numerous cave formations throughout the entire region. About 130 caves have been found so far, and range from small ones to those two miles in length and from 10 to 75 feet in height. Some of these go to great depths. There is the beauty of Crystal Cave, the splendor of Skull Cave, the endless galleries of Catcomb Cave and Indian Paintings and bas relief of unknown age in Big Painted, Fern Ship and Indian Wells caves. The camp is but two months old and is modern even to the point of having an all-wave radio in the recreation tent and a radio in the mess hall. Captain Elmer Fearn is company commander and Lieut. Tate is executive officer. Dr. Forbes is camp surgeon, Harrison Hale is senior foreman and Edward Calhoun is clerk. James Kithredge is assistant educational advisor and Johnny Solozano is first aid orderly. I. M. Poy is project superintendent, with Joe Hudson non-technical foreman, Bob Bryson, mechanic, and Jack Lawton, blacksmith. The kitchen staff consists of Roy T. Welch, mess steward; Dale Kitchen and Mike Bennis, first cooks; Cecil Chaseman and Arthur Locke, second cooks, and Rudolph Poil, baker.
