Stocks Go Down

The Italo-Ethiopian crisis had financial repercussions. Prices on the Rome stock exchange slipped as much as 40 points.

Any application of sanctions against Italy to halt its Ethiopian campaign—already being discussed in League of Nations—drew an answer from Italy.

A royal decree gave Premier Mussolini sole power to interpret the international war code for Italy—a legal position to answer any attacks on his African program.

The decree established a commission for "revision of the agreements which have disciplined the conduct of war among the belligerents and neutrals," and provided that Mussolini should be the sole judge of such actions.

Italy forged ahead in its preparations for hostilities in East Africa, ten steamers loading at Naples for immediate sailing. But, with the rainy season persisting in Ethiopia, most diplomats believed war would not start before October 10.

League Waits Decision

The League of Nations still awaited Mussolini's decision on its five-power committee's proposal for development of Ethiopia as a basis for negotiations for East Africa peace.

League statesmen held little hope that Duce's answer would be conciliatory, in view of the wide gap between the proposal and Italy's demands in East Africa.

A meeting of the Italian cabinet was called for tomorrow from which a decision was expected.

A survey of European financial circles showed that private financial sanctions already have been virtually applied against Italy.

A Paris authority said French pockets were empty to foreign borrowers, especially if money was wanted for war.

British financial authorities said England had closed its money chests to Italy, and similar word came from other capitals of Europe.

Italian government spokesmen asserted, however, that Italy was ready to go ahead with its African campaign "without economic help from anyone."
