The bride will be wearing a gown of white crepe, with a slight train. A long veil, caught up with orange blossoms, will adorn her head, and she will carry an arm bouquet of delphiniums and Joana Hill roses in delicate shades of pink and yellow.

Her attendants will be gowned in pastel shades of green, pink and yellow taffeta, and will be carrying arm bouquets of roses and delphiniums in matching shades.

The pastel shades in large asters will strike the basic note for the decorations, which will carry out the colors found in the gowns and bouquets of the bridal party.

Following the ceremony, a reception will be held in the reception room of the church. The couple will be away for a short time, after which they will be at home to friends here.
