built their first church, donating their labor. In 1897-1898. Two lots west of the church were bought, on one of which a parsonage was built. The labor again being donated by the members, and the other sold in 1912 to S. A. Koehler. The parsonage was rebuilt and enlarged in 1911.  
The present beautiful fire-proof concrete church was built in 1927-1928 at a cost of \$20,000.  
The congregation has been served by the following pastors: Rev. Frank H. Sack, 1897-1907; Max Market, 1907-1911; Conrad Wilker, 1911-1915; W. R. Meyer, O. S. F., 1915-1923; Edwin Johnson, 1923-1927; F. W. Busard, 1927-1928; H. C. Funk, 1928-1931; Geo. P. Kabele, 1931.  
The English language was used in the Sunday school since 1911, as also for most of the services, until 1923,

since which time the English language only has been used in all departments of the church and services.  
Before the coming of the Rev. Edwin Johnson, the original congregation had become scattered and it was reorganized April 19, 1923, as an American Lutheran church. It has since grown to a communicant membership of nearly 100, and 150 baptized members. During the present pastorate since Dec. 1, 1931, the Sunday school has increased from 25 to 115 members, with classes for all grades and faithful and efficient teachers. Mr. Martin G. Paulson is superintendent. There is an organized adult Bible class of 30 members taught by the pastor and of which Mrs. W. H. Klein Smith is president. Mr. O. G. Crow, vice-president, and Mrs. Ruth Demmer, secretary.

The Ladies' Aid society has always been an important factor in the social life of the church, and as a financial

helper. The present officers are: Mrs. J. B. Yarbrough, president; Mrs. Alf Brevold, vice-president; Mrs. Elsie Beth Fluhner and Mrs. M. G. Paulson, secretaries; and Mrs. Fred Honner, treasurer. It has a membership of about 40.

The present Young People's Luther League was organized Jan. 29, 1932, and now has 27 members. It conducts devotional meetings on Sunday evenings, and has two business and social meetings a month on the second and fourth Mondays. Its officers are: Mrs. Everett Bingham, president; Harold Pederson, vice-president; Ruth Demmer, secretary; Dorothy Andren, corresponding secretary; and John Brevold, treasurer.
