## RING WISEAGRES AGREE THAT JOE WILL WIN BY K. O.

### Fight Tomorrow Night Will Be First In Million Dollar Class Since Gene Tunney Took Long Count.

NEW YORK, Sept. 22.—(AP)—Whether or not it's a happy landing for the dusky warrior of the prize ring, the sensational pugilistic flight of the "Brown Bomber," 21-year old Joe Louis, comes to a climax tomorrow evening in the first million-dollar setting that boxing has known since Gene Tunney took the long count at Chicago eight years ago.

The sudden, hard-hitting negro from Detroit, whose rapid rise is synonymous with a return of pugilistic boom-days that is little short of incredible, stakes his unbroken professional-winning streak and his championship ambitions against the rugged but erratic former champion, Max Baer. The two are matched for 15 rounds but it doesn't figure to go the limit.

A majority of the hundreds of fight critics gathered for one of the biggest fist-flinging parties in New York's sporting history favors Louis to win by a knockout.

The betting odds are 1 to 2 in favor of the "Brown Bomber," untested in 24 consecutive fights and a two-fisted puncher whose advantages in youth, speed, boxing and hitting ability appear to outweigh the iron-jawed resistance or slugging power of the curly-headed Californian.

This writer picks Louis to batter down the playboy of the prize ring inside five or six rounds. On form and past performances, despite his youth and comparative inexperience, Louis looks to have a decisive edge.

But that doesn't mean there are not two distinct sides to this fistie argument. If he's really in shape for a rough and tumble punching party, Baer might produce sufficient weapons to overpower the young negro and abruptly end his dynamic sweep.

Rated off his last appearance in a New York ring, where he lost his title to Jim Braddock, Maxie has nothing to lose and everything to gain in "abandoning the works."

From every angle, it figures to be a thrilling show for the greatest crowd that has ever witnessed a prize fight in New York. With only a few thousand tickets unsold today and an advance sale amounting to \$550,000, Promoter Mike Jacobs, one-time associate of the renowned Tex Rickard, predicted a sell-out.

This, said Mike, would mean \$2,500,000 in gross gate receipts, a record for a non-championship fight.

From a money standpoint, the fight, on a sell-out basis, will be second only to the Firpo-Dempsey battle of 1923, which produced a "gate" of \$1,188,000 from 82,000 cash customers. The non-title record is \$1,063,000, set by the Dempsey-Shanley fight at the Yankee stadium in 1927.

It's a Gold Mine  
Win, lose or draw, it's a certain gold mine for all concerned. With a net "gate" of slightly more than \$1,000,000, after the deduction of state and federal taxes, each fighter will collect 30 per cent or about \$300,000.

The main lure undoubtedly is the prospect of seeing more fireworks than the heavyweight class has produced altogether in the last half dozen years. The match itself is a "natural," bringing together the two outstanding contenders for the crown worn by Jimmy Braddock.

For the while, the fame of Louis and his explosive punch has been the chief factor in reviving pugilistic interest. Baer, too, has a tremendous following and his adherents will be out in force in the hope of seeing the one time movie hero of the "Prize Fighter" and the "Lead" attempt a comeback.

Louis may labor under the handicap of entering the ring a pronounced favorite, but so far the slow moving negro with the rapid fire punch in either hand, has manifested no fighting worries.

He looks the part of a finished ring warrior, with years instead of months of experience behind him. Expertly handled, he knows all the tricks of the trade. He's tremendously powerful as well as shifty, a methodical workman who does as thorough a finishing job as anybody the business has developed.

Both fighters, remaining at their camps today, will make fast trips to town for the weighing in about noon tomorrow. Scaling around 210, Baer probably will have an advantage of a dozen pounds.

## CUBS ASSURED LEAD OF TWO GAMES FOR SERIES WITH CARDS

The Chicago Cubs were almost ready today to coast into the National league pennant under the momentum generated by their amazing 19-game winning streak.

Idle for two days while the second place St. Louis Cardinals tackle the Pirates today, the Cubs were assured of having at least a two-game lead when their final "pay-off" series with the Cards starts Wednesday.

That much was made certain yesterday when Larry French pitched Chicago to a 2 to 0 victory over Pittsburgh in the 11th of the amazing string of triumphs that has carried them to the top.

The Cards won a doubleheader from Cincinnati, taking the first game 14 to 4 when the Reds went to pieces and made seven errors to aid the 15 Cardinal hits. Dizzy Dean captured the second when he limited the Reds to three hits in a mound duel with Al Hollingsworth to win 3 to 1 and reduce Chicago's margin to three games.

The Cards will have to win four out of five from Chicago to take the flag, if they succeed in trimming the Pirates. If they do, the final standing will be St. Louis won 99, lost 55; Chicago, won 98, lost 56.

## SERAPHS, SEALS START PLAYOFF SERIES TUESDAY

Portland Beavers Lose Double Bill To Acorns To Skid Into Third Place In The Final Standings.

The 1935 Pacific coast league baseball season is all over today—except for the small matter of determining the championship.

To decide this final question the Los Angeles Angels, winners of the first half of the split season, this week will meet the San Francisco Seals, second half victors, in a seven-game playoff series starting in San Francisco Tuesday.

The Seals, who clung near the top spot all the second half and then won going away in a fine closing drive, ended with a three and a half game margin over the second-place San Francisco Missions.

Using everybody but the batboy yesterday, the Seals still had enough to split their final doubleheader with the Seattle Indians, dropping the first game, 6-10, and staging a batfist to win the second, 10 to 1.

Joe Dimaggio, the young outfielder who has sparked the Seals attack all season, finished in a blaze of glory by hammering out two home runs and a double in the closing game.

The Missions, out of the pennant picture since Friday, failed to gain ground when they divided a double bill with the last-place Hollywood Stars. The Stars won the opener, 5 to 7, and the Missions the nightcap, 14 to 7.

The Portland Beavers, who cracked badly in the final week, went down to a double defeat before the Oakland Oaks, who took a five to two edge in the series by winning 5-1 and 6-1.

The Angels, increasingly unimpressive as the season progressed, managed to wind up in fourth place. They divided yesterday's doubleheader with Sacramento, winning the opener, 11-4 and dropping the second, 7-8.

The Seals are certain to be strong favorites in the playoff on the basis of recent performances. Four games will be played in San Francisco, closing with a doubleheader Thursday. The series will end in Los Angeles.

## BATTLE ROYAL OF MIDDLEWEIGHTS ON COMING CARD

Several weeks ago Medford saw its first battle royal. For sheer speed, action and butchery, the bout surpassed anything ever seen here, and the interest was so great that Promoter Lillard has decided to present another, this one faster if possible than the other, with some of the best middleweights on the coast, with Toy Aho of Portland, Roland Warren of Klamath Falls, Russ Riley of Carlsbad, N. M., Curley Woods and Floyd Wolfgang of Medford.

All of these men have been seen here, and all are faster than grass lightning. Toy Aho, at 170, will have the weight advantage, with Woods coming in at 165, the lightest man in the bout. The rest are pretty well scattered through that range. The match will be similar to the heavyweight mess, with everyone going at it hammer and tongs until only two remain. These two will then catch their breath for five minutes, and then return to the finish, one fall.

It is generally conceded that middleweights are the fastest wrestlers alive. For several minutes at least, they'll be too fast to be seen if the other battle was any indication. According to Lillard, pasteboards for the affair are already going fast, with sales opened only today.
