

SPECIAL OFFER OF MAIL TRIBUNE BRINGS BIG GAIN

177 Per Cent Increase Is
Shown in First Two Days
As Low Rates Appeal to
Many New Subscribers

The first two days of the Mail Tribune's bargain period showed an increase in payments of 177 per cent over a year ago, while the number of new subscribers at the end of the second day disclosed an increase of 87 per cent, according to figures compiled today by Gerald T. Latham, circulation manager.

The best results obtained in several years are expected to be recorded this year as the bulk of the subscriptions are usually received the last few days of the bargain period.

Mail Tribune bargain days opened last Saturday and will close October 1. During that time subscribers are offered the opportunity of receiving the newspaper daily and Sunday for considerably less than 2 cents a day.

The special rate in force until October 1 is 85 a year for carrier delivery and 83 a year for mail delivery a day, for mail delivery in Jackson, Josephine and Siskiyou counties. For a modern metropolitan daily this is considered one of the best offers obtainable anywhere in the country.

New and old subscribers alike are eligible for the low bargain rates, the only condition being that those already on the subscription list be paid up to September 1.

With improved and augmented wire, local and feature services the Mail Tribune is better equipped than ever before to give the public a complete newspaper. With the extremely low rates now in effect it is believed that no one in this locality can afford to be without the Mail Tribune.

LOCAL WPA CHIEFTAIN OUTLINES OBJECTIVES IN TALK TO KIWANISANS

Tom Delzell, WPA head here, in an interesting address before the Kiwanis club yesterday noon, stated that the purpose of the WPA organization was to put three and a half million people back to work by November 1 of this year. The work program administration is primarily designed to provide work for those who really desire it, he said, and told of preliminary work now underway in getting the organization into working form. It is expected, he said, that 5000 men in the district will be on partial relief after November 15 this year.

Delzell told the Kiwanians that no projects will start in this district for several weeks, because there is no apparent lack of work here at the present time. Any projects that will put men to work, where the man-labor overflows the cost of materials, is eligible for WPA consideration, Delzell pointed out. Already \$44,000 in projects has been approved, and \$110,000 are now pending for Jackson county. In reviewing the activity already manifested here, Delzell stated that Jackson county has made more progress than any of the other 7 counties comprising the district.

FORMER CUB PITCHER SERVES OLD TEAM BY TROUNCING CARDINALS

When Charley Grimm, manager of the Cubs, traded Big Jim Weaver to Pittsburgh last winter, he probably didn't realize that the oversize right-hander would pitch Chicago into the National league pennant.

Weaver did that stunt yesterday when he blanked the challenging Cardinals with four hits, and his Pirates mates pounded out a 12-9 victory over the 1934 world champions.

That came as near as possible to tossing the pennant right into the Cubs' laps, for the only way St. Louis can win the flag outright is to trim Chicago five games straight in their final series, which starts tomorrow.

The Cardinal defeat, while the Cubs enjoyed the first two days of idleness after their 18-game winning streak, put the Cards three and one-half games behind Chicago.

If they beat the Pirates today, the Cardinals can gain a tie for the flag by beating the Cubs four out of five. If they lose to Pittsburgh, it will eliminate the possibility of a tie and require five straight or nothing.

DEER CONTINUE TO LURE NIMRODS BUT FEW COME IN

There's a lot of gunning going on out in the hills and dales but thus far few hunters have rushed back to town to tell of the big deer they have bagged. In sporting circles today rumors that the gunners had suddenly become modest were branded as greatly exaggerated.

What has happened, it is stated at hunting headquarters here, is that the hunters are having such a good time out in the open, that they are reluctant to return to the city immediately. In a couple of days, however, it is expected that the riflemen will come marching back with tall deer and taller tales.

That hundreds of hunters from this locality are out stalking the wary deer cannot be denied. The number of licenses issued proves that a small army of nimrods has gone forth and it's the kind of army, sportsmen still in town say, that does not come back without a goodly supply of venison. J. P. Turpin of Phoenix was among the first to get his allotment of deer meat. He brought down a big five-point mule deer Sunday near Bald Mountain and the animal dressed at 205 pounds. Mr. Turpin brought the head today to Al Piche's sports store for mounting.

John Crouch was successful in bringing down a deer of 170 pounds net in the Blue Canyon, while out in the Gold Hill sector Seth Coy, the baseballer, was leading a party into the upper reaches of Sardinia creek. The CCO contingent thus far has been out in the front in bringing down the fleet-footed animals and today Major G. R. Owens, district commander, reported bagging a forked-horn mule deer in the Dog Lake section below Lakeview, while his driver, Vern H. Norris, brought down a four-pointer.

A party headed by Capt. Glenn J. Key bagged three mule tails, the captain himself dropping a four-pointer. In the party were also Lieut. Thomas P. Coates, Lieut. Fred W. Greene and Leonard A. Williams. They hunted east of Lakeview.

Frank Robinson, also of the CCO, went hunting for deer near Silver Lake but bagged a coyote instead.

DELZELL SPEAKER AT ROTARY MEET

An interesting, informal discussion of the activities of the Works Progress Administration was given by Tom Delzell at today's luncheon meeting of the Medford Rotary club at the Hotel Medford. Mr. Delzell, who heads the W. P. A. organization for the southwestern Oregon counties, stressed the fact that every possible step would be taken by his office to avoid competition with private industry. Works Progress projects will be launched when seasonal employment has abated, according to the speaker.

In opening his enlightening address, Delzell explained the scope and functions of the often-confused alphabetic organizations, the WPA and the WPA. He described the comprehensive set-up of the newly created Works Progress office here and paid a high tribute to the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce, the county court and the planning board because of their prompt filing of sponsored projects for late fall and winter employment here.

MAYOR INSPECTS CONTROL OF RUST

Mayor George W. Porter headed a group of Medford men who left this morning on an educational trip intended to acquaint them with the effective work being done in eradicating blister rust from the national forests in this district.

In the group were B. E. Harder, president; H. A. Thierolf, vice-president, and A. H. Banwell, manager of the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce, and Karl Janouch, supervisor of the Rogue River National forest.

The group motored first to Prospect, where the party was joined by Conrad Weesela, in charge of blister rust control in the national forests of this district, and Wesley Spinney, assistant to Mr. Weesela. The group was then to proceed to Foster creek and Muir creek camps, lunch to be served at the latter place. The men were to return to Medford this evening.

STORE LIABLE FOR CLERKS MISSTEP

BOSTON.—(UPI)—A new legal precedent was established here, lawyers believe, when the U. S. court of appeals ruled that it is negligence and not an accident when a salesgirl unintentionally steps on a customer's foot.

The action of the court came in a decision upholding the award of \$3,300 damages made by a lower court to Miss Katherine Dunne of Newton, Mass.

Miss Dunne sued a store, alleging that a salesgirl had stepped from behind a counter and had cut Miss Dunne's foot with her heel. Miss Dunne testified that blood poisoning had developed and she had been forced to spend several days in a hospital.

In its decision the court said: "There is nothing in the record to indicate as a matter of law what the plaintiff was not in the exercise of due care, or had any warning that the salesgirl was about to step back into the aisle without stopping or looking."

AGED MAN HIT BY CAR SUFFERS FRACTURED LEG

J. H. Doubleday, 70, who lives alone in a cabin on North McAndrews road, was reported resting comfortably today at Community hospital whither he was taken yesterday after being struck by an automobile as he was attempting to cross North Riverside avenue near his home. He suffered a compound fracture of the left leg, below the knee, a dislocated left shoulder and shock.

The car that struck Mr. Doubleday was operated by Miss Frances Parker, Route 1, Central Point. She was charged with speeding, hearing being tentatively set for tomorrow, pending outcome of the injuries to Mr. Doubleday.

Miss Parker reported to police that she was driving south on North Riverside when Mr. Doubleday stepped off the curb. She tried to swerve around him but he became confused and ran in front of the machine, she stated. Police said the car slid 60 feet after brakes had been applied and came to a stop against the curb.

Mr. Doubleday has been unable to give any information about himself or his version of the accident, police said.
