

JACKSON COUNTY ON \$1,600,000 ROAD PROGRAM

Contracts to Be Let Soon Call for Grading at Two Points Pacific Highway—Plan Other Improvements

SALEM, Sept. 24.—(AP)—Highway contracts estimated to reach \$1,600,000 will be awarded by the road commission at its two-day letting in Portland October 8 and 9, it was announced today when bids were called.

The work will be done in 19 counties, including Marion, Douglas, Jackson, Klamath, Multnomah and Umatilla.

Grading and surfacing work will cover about 43 miles, while 18 bridges and culverts will be constructed. Most of the work will be paid for out of federal aid funds. Approximately half will be let each day.

Contracts to be awarded are as follows:

Clatsop county—Nehalem river-Block creek section of Wolf Creek highway, 2.59 miles grading and approximately 8.05 miles of clearing.

Cook and Deschutes counties—Construction of 12 concrete bridge or culverts on the Redmond-Bend section of The Dalles-California highway in Deschutes county, and widen and construct concrete sidewalks on bridge over Ochoco creek at the east city limits of Prineville on the Ochoco highway in Crook county.

Deschutes county—Units No. 1 and 2, Redmond-Bend section of The Dalles-California highway, 2.62 miles of grading.

Marion county—Construct a 48'x120' addition to frame storage buildings located at the state highway department shops at Salem.

Tillamook county—Brooks-Jordan creek section of Wilson river highway, furnishing and installing approximately 3200 linear feet pipe culverts, and 64,000 pounds metal reinforcement in concrete box culverts.

Wallowa county—Rock creek-Wallowa section of Wallowa lake highway, 4.28 miles regrading, surfacing and oil mat surface treatment.

Wasco county—Clear creek section of Wapinitia highway, 4.37 miles regrading, surfacing and bituminous macadam wearing surface; also furnishing crushed rock in stockpile.

Jackson county—Ashland-Nett creek section of Pacific highway, 5.12 miles grading, also north unit, Torrent creek section of Pacific highway, 0.88 mile grading.

Klamath county—Construction of a 288-foot concrete bridge over the Southern Pacific company's tracks on the Klamath Falls-Weed highway near Midland.

Malheur county—Construction of two bridges over China creek and two culverts on the Juntura-Chimney creek section of the Central Oregon highway, also federal lands portions of west unit, Jordan creek section of I. O. N. highway, 9.61 miles of grading, and private lands portions of west unit, Jordan creek section of I. O. N. highway, 1.64 miles of grading.

Multnomah county—Construct superstructure for Eagle creek bridge on the Columbia river highway near Bonnetville.

Umatilla county—Emigrant hill-Emigrant Springs section of the old Oregon Trail, 6.95 miles regrading, surfacing and constructing bituminous macadam wearing surface, and furnishing crushed rock in stockpile.

YOUNG ARE EXHORTED KEEP CHRISTIAN LIFE FOR BENEFITS IN AGE

Rev. Fred M. Weatherford of the Church of the Nazarene Sunday morning delivered an expository message from the 12th chapter of Ecclesiastes. In part he said:

"Character is guided by some governing principle. It may be an unwritten code of standards. If unsteady the trend of those governing principles will be downward.

"This chapter is the conclusion of God in behalf of youth. If he will take to himself the governing principles of God, he will have surrounded himself with the bliss of life. The fundamental governing power of the Christian life is Christ enthroned within.

"This Scripture exhorts to a remembrance of our Creator in the day of youth.

"Youth should remember God for what He is. He is our Creator; we are indebted to him for all. He is able to make us wise unto salvation by faith in Him.

"If you would save yourself from the scourge of physical disipation, remember God while young. He who does not remember God in His claims for redemption will remember the fruits of unrighteousness forever. Whatever impairs the thinking machinery or breaks down the physical prematurely is the snare that moral bankruptcy lays at the door of old age.

"The spirit of this age is to crush the demands of the Creator and magnify those of the creature. This can be met only by a yielding to the Christ of Redemption.

"The concluding appeal of God in this chapter is summed up in these words: 'Let us hear the conclusion of the whole matter; fear God and keep His commandments; for this is the whole duty of man.'

Two responded to the evangelistic appeal at the conclusion of the message.

STATE BANK BILL BALLOT TITLE IS ASKED BY GRANGE

Initiative Petitions Require 16,000 Signatures Before Measure Can Be Placed On Coming Election Ballot

SALEM, Sept. 24.—(AP)—A preliminary initiative petition was filed with the secretary of state today for the creation and operation of a state bank, and a ballot title was requested. Initiative petitions require signatures of more than 16,000 voters before it can be placed on the ballot.

The measure proposed is similar to the senate bill 111 introduced during the last session by Peter Zimmerman, but which failed to pass. Sponsors of the initiative are the state Grange and the State Federation of Labor.

Under the act a state bank would be created for a depository of all public funds. It would be in charge of a board of directors composed of the state treasurer as chairman, the governor, secretary of state, attorney general and the labor commissioner. The board would select a manager for the bank.

CO. A TO PUT IN FULL DAY SUNDAY AT RIFLE RANGE

A full day of firing will engage Company A, 186th Infantry, next Sunday at the rifle range three miles east of the city, it was announced today by Capt. Carl Y. Tengwald.

As Sunday's practice is an important detail, Captain Tengwald urged every member of the organization to be present. Firing will start promptly at 8 a. m., he said, and continue until evening. Both the 30 and 22-caliber rifles will be utilized.

Company cooks will serve mess at noon so that members may remain at the ranges throughout the day, the captain explained.

Captain Tengwald expects every man to qualify for marksmanship by the end of the day.

Company A is composed of 60 men and at present there are four or five vacancies which Captain Tengwald is eager to fill. The minimum age limit for membership is 18 years.

The captain pointed out that high school youths of proper age are eligible for membership and school credit may be obtained by students who fill the requirements.

There are various benefits to be obtained through membership, it was emphasized, not the least of which is an encampment of two weeks each

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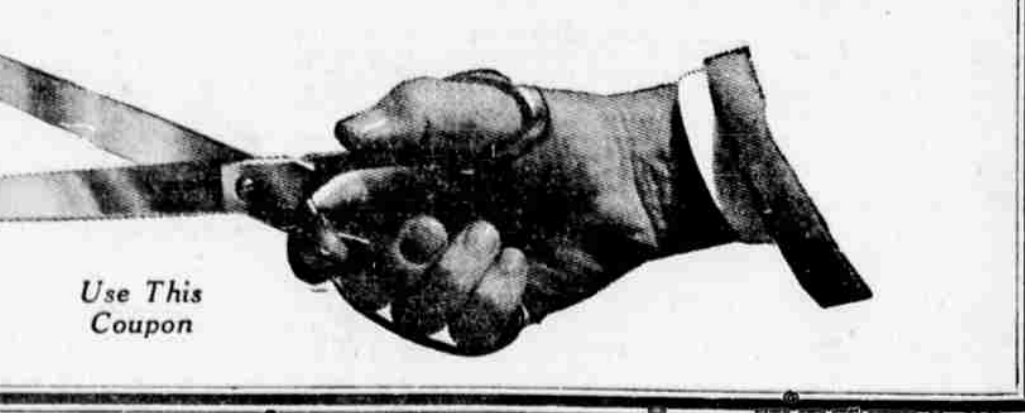
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RESERVE OFFICERS TO HEAR TACTICAL TALK
