### ROOSEVELT LISTS BANNED MUNITIONS

WASHINGTON, Sept. 26.—(AP)—A proclamation was issued today by President Roosevelt listing arms and munitions which later could be kept out of export trade to belligerent nations.

Until a later proclamation is issued, it simply will be necessary for dealers in the enumerated articles to obtain licenses for their exports from the new munitions control board. The board, at present, has no authority to deny a license for such shipments. The proclamation set forth six categories and confined the banned items to arms, ammunition and implements of war.

### NEWSPAPER CHAIN PROFIT TO PUBLIC

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Sept. 26.—(UP)—Frank E. Gannett, publisher of the Gannett newspapers, today announced a plan to perpetuate his newspaper chain after his death, on a basis of service to the public rather than for private profit. The newspapers, now numbering 19 in 14 cities, will be controlled by the Frank E. Gannett Newspaper Foundation, Inc., in perpetuity. The charter of the foundation stipulates that after dividends have been paid on a comparatively small amount of preferred stock, at least 75 per cent of the net income of the corporation shall be distributed for "public charitable, educational and general philanthropic uses and purposes."

### SELASSIE'S LIONS KILL 1, INJURE 5

ADDIS ABABA, Sept. 26.—(P)—Five of Emperor Haile Selassie's big lions escaped today, killed one sentry and injured five more, two gravely.

In their rush for freedom they devoured several of the emperor's pedigreed Australian sheep and killed two horses.

Colonel Mekouria, the commander of the imperial guard, seized a machine gun and shot all five beasts in succession.

After Mekouria had killed the lions, one of the beasts was found astride a dead sentry.

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Sept. 26.—(UP)—Slightly tipsy, a man stumbled over a prostrate form on the sidewalk today. He shook the fallen one, muttered for him to get up and go home. ### ACUTE SHORTAGE OF RESIDENCES REPORTED HERE

An acute shortage of modern apartments and small homes was reported here today by real estate firms.

The shortage is said to be equally acute in the moderate and cheap rental classifications.

There are fewer up-to-date homes and apartments available now than at any time in the past several years, realtors said.

The present scarcity is attributed to an influx of emigrants from the drought sections of the mid-west farm belt and southern California and to the presence here of officers of the CCC who have taken up residence in furnished apartments and homes.

Whereas, up to last year Brown & White invariably had about 200 listings in the moderate rental class on their books at all times, today the firm had only three listings of furnished apartments and dwellings and none at all that were unfurnished. It was stated at the realty office that the firm had never before experienced such a shortage.

He pointed out that, if capital is lacking, loans at low interest rates may be obtained by property owners for purposes of modernization.
