STUDENTS FIGHT OVER RING BOUT

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 27.—(AP)—Police rushed squads to the Tyler junior high school today as white youths and negro students fought, some of them said, over the result of the Joe Louis-Max Baer fight.

No arrests were made. John Downer, principal of the school, asserted "as far as I know, the children of the school were not responsible for the trouble. Classes are proceeding as usual."

He added, however, he had signed permits to allow parents of 35 white children to keep their children at home for the day, and police struggling to disperse the throng on the viaduct advised the 100 negro students of the school to return home and remain away from school until next Monday.
