

OLD-TIMERS WAIT FOR AID OF RAIN IN HUNTING DEER

A survey of the recreational activities on the Rogue River National forest for the past week reveals that hunting in the various districts is practically a thing of the past, the U. S. forest service reported today. There still appear to be a few Frank Waltons in the lower streams but most of them have given way to the nimble artists.

Hunting conditions are described as practically the same as last week. Due to an exceptional dry spell the deer are lying close in the thick underbrush, and one is lucky to get within shooting distance of the wary animal, foresters say.

There appear to be few hunters of the old school who have ventured into the hills as yet. Most of them are waiting for the first rain to improve hunting conditions.

Open season on grouse and native pheasants is now on in Klamath county. However to date there have been only a few of the birds taken. The season in Jackson county does not open until October 15.

The prospects for duck hunting are reported as very good. Many of the old timers say there are more ducks in Upper Unquaga lake than ever before for this time of the year. The northern ducks have not started to come in as yet, but are expected soon.

"We again would like to warn the sportsman to be extremely careful with their fires and matches," Supervisor Karl L. Janouch said. "The forest is so extremely dry that it is only a matter of minutes for a burning cigarette to become a raging uncontrollable forest fire. Put out that last spark."

Jelly of the Week



Spiced Plum Jam
4 cups (2 lbs.) prepared fruit
7 1/2 cups (3 1/4 lbs.) sugar
1/2 bottle fruit pectin

To prepare fruit, pit (do not peel) about 2 1/2 pounds fully ripe plums. Cut in small pieces and crush thoroughly. Add 1 teaspoon each cinnamon, cloves, and all spice, or any desired combination of spices.

Measure sugar and prepared fruit into large kettle. Mix and bring to a full rolling boil over hottest fire. Stir constantly before and while boiling. Boil hard 1 minute. Remove from fire and stir in bottled fruit pectin. Skim; pour quickly. Paraffin hot jam at once. Makes about 11 glasses (6 fluid ounces each).

NOVICE HAS LAUGH ON SEASONED PAIR IN HUNT FOR DEER

CLERGYMEN OFFERING CRITICAL SUGGESTIONS IN ANSWERS TO F. D. R.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27. — (AP) — News dispatches from widely scattered sections indicated today that clergymen were offering varied, some-

times critical, suggestions in response to President Roosevelt's request for their "counsel and advice."

A San Francisco pastor said he would suggest that the President "re-main true to the constitution," while a Chicago rabbi said the President's letter to the clergy was a "practical, as well as a good political move."

The President addressed his letter to representative clergymen in all parts of the country, saying that "because of the grave responsibilities of my office," he was "turning to representative clergymen for counsel and advice, feeling confident that no

group can give more accurate or unbiased reply."

In response, Dr. David M. Steele, rector emeritus of the church of St. Luke and the Epiphany of Philadelphia, in an "open letter" accused the President of "playing politics on the low plane with which you have made us all familiar."
