## ITALY WILL WAIT COUPLE WEEKS TO OPEN HOSTILITIES

which yesterday fixed a three months' time limit against hostilities, decided in principle to accept Emperor Haile Selassie's plea for a commission of neutral observers to watch over Ethiopia's frontiers.

The emperor suggested such a commission would be able to determine impartially which nation was the aggressor, promising it every cooperation.

Vatican prelates interpreted Pope Pius' address to the eucharistic congress in Cleveland as a plea for peace specifically to Italy and Ethiopia. The end of the rainy season saw the people of Ethiopia celebrating their festival of maskal with ancient ceremonies—laid this year with military preparations.

Some British quarters discussed the possibility of another cabinet meeting shortly to consider the new phase in international politics brought about by the present stage of the Italian-Ethiopian dispute.

French officials in Paris said Great Britain and France were negotiating for a mutual assistance agreement to cope with any European war threat.

The suggested pact was described as an outgrowth of the dispute between Italy and Ethiopia and one official said: "Premier Laval now has no fear of going ahead with Great Britain."

## BOARD TO DISCUSS ARMY AIR BASE

A special meeting of the Oregon state board of aeronautics will be held Monday, either in this city or in Klamath Falls for the purpose of discussing efforts to obtain an army air base for the northwest. It was learned today by Fred Heath, Jr., of the aeronautics board of the Jackson county chamber of commerce, who received a telegram to that effect from Allan D. Greenwood, secretary of the state board.

The exact time for the meeting has not yet been announced, the telegram indicated, but it is believed that it will be held in about two weeks. Similar meetings are being held today at Swan Island airport in Portland, tomorrow at Cornelius, and Sunday at Eugene.

## \$71,200 REVENUE FROM RACE BETS

SALEM, Sept. 27.—(AP)—The state's proceeds from the dog and horse races operated in Oregon the past year fell to the lowest point in three years that pari-mutuel wagering has been legalized. The total received by the state was \$71,200, which represents two and a half per cent of the total amount which went through the betting windows at the dog races in Portland, the Graham horse races and the races at the state fair.

Last year the state received \$83,000, while the first year of operation a total of \$18,948 was received. The money will be apportioned as follows: The state fair and the Pacific Livestock association will each receive \$22,500. Counties will receive \$17,800, or \$494 to each county for county fairs. The Eastern Oregon Livestock exposition and the Oregon roundup each will receive \$3,550, and the Roseburg Turkey show will receive \$1,058.
