

### COUNTY BUDGET DRAFTERS HOLD FIRST MEETING

J. W. McCoy of Ashland was elected chairman of the Jackson county budget committee at its first meeting at the county court this afternoon.

H. A. Thieroff was elected secretary. The 1935 budget committee, composed of the county court and H. A. Thieroff, Medford, M. D. Chase, Table Rock, and J. W. McCoy, Ashland will hold its first meeting today for the purpose of organizing and discussing plans for the budget. A chairman and a secretary will be chosen. First regular meeting of the budget committee is scheduled for next week. The sessions will be held. County Judge Day said today, so they will not conflict with the business duties of the appointive members.

Most of the county officers and departments have submitted their budgets for the year. For the most they are the same as last year. Two offices have asked for pay increases for workers. It is reported.

The "chaotic condition" that prevailed for a couple of years in county budget making has been eliminated, and it will not be such a hectic task as in 1931-32-33. The county court has systematized the work.

Relief and roads promises to be the main problem before the budget committee. Funds are to be urged for road and bridge repairs, which have deteriorated the past five or six years. Some of the roads are now in such shape, the county stands to lose the original investment, unless they are fixed.

There are a dozen or so bridges that need repairs, and it is planned to put them in first-class shape. The county court figures, if an accident should

### LIQUOR PERMITS TO BE SMALLER, \$79,567 NETTED

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 27.—(UP)—The Oregon liquor control commission today headed the grumbling of liquor buyers concerning untidely current permits, which have to be folded several times to fit a billfold.

Permits next year and thereafter will be printed on small cards of billfold size. The 1936 permits will be green, and the color will be changed annually. Stubs of duplicate record will be filed at the store of purchase to permit closer checking on permit holders.

The commission revealed that sale of permits to September 1 netted \$79,567.50, despite reduction from \$1 to 50 cents this spring. The commission sold 112,738 permits this year.

The commission revoked 10 beer licenses including that of Dorothy Jennings, Medford, accused of permitting her license to be used by another operator, and Erwin Sanger, Estacada, accused of selling beer to a minor.
