## MASONS CONTINUE WAR ON INSANITY

CLEVELAND, Sept. 28.—(AP)—The supreme council of ancient accepted Scottish Rite Masons, northern jurisdiction, approved a \$40,000 appropriation today to finance a continuance of its fight against dementia praecox, a form of insanity.

In making the appropriation, the council accepted a report of Dr. Nolan D. C. Lewis of St. Elizabeth's hospital, Washington, D. C., who recommended a concerted and coordinated drive against the affliction, to be led by 200 of the country's leading scientists.

Dementia praecox, the doctor said, has filled one-fourth of all the hospital beds in the United States and is costing \$40,000,000 a year for treatment. The disease, he asserted, constitutes the largest unsolved medical problem confronting science today.

The approval of the appropriation was one of the principal acts of the council's final session here. Next year's meeting, officials announced, will open the fourth Tuesday of September at Boston.

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
