

Oregon Gridmen Blast Gonzaga 18 to 0 in Portland Night Game

WEBFEET UNCORK DAZZLING DRIVE IN LAST PERIOD

Callison Squad Pass And Rip Way To Decisive Win — Braddock Stars.

MULTNOMAH STADIUM, Portland, Sept. 28.—(AP)—University of Oregon's football team uncorked a dazzling, versatile offensive in its opening game here tonight and passed and ripped its way to a sparkling 18 to 0 win over Gonzaga university of Spokane.

Bud Goodin, a sophomore from Astoria, Cal., who was out all last season with injuries, provided the aerial magic and sparked in the running attack for Oregon. Fullback Frank Michiek, however, was the backbone of Oregon's heavy artillery, with Bob Braddock, husky transfer from Southern Oregon Normal, breaking loose for some fine gains.

Gonzaga capitalized on every break by bringing effective aerial attack into play, but neither its nor the Bulldogs' running attack was sustained.

Boiling into the fray with a great show of aggressiveness, Oregon's line outgained Gonzaga in the opening minutes and Del Bjork, giant tackle, blocked Olson's punt with Oregon taking the ball on Gonzaga's 12-yard line.

After a holding penalty, Goodin's into play, but neither it nor the Bulldogs' running attack was sustained.

Another Oregon drive in the fourth quarter, featured by a 25-yard dash by Michiek and a 21-yard dash by Braddock, was turned into a touchdown when Goodin passed to Jones, who sidestepped a tackler on Gonzaga's 10-yard line and dashed across for a touchdown. Michiek's kick again was wild.

Oregon's substitutes grabbed themselves a touchdown when King croaked over the line on a 10-yard dash after Lassalle, with help from Donnell, put the ball in scoring territory. Donnell's place kick for extra point was low.

George Karamatic, wearing No. 77, made famous last year by Gonzaga's Little American Mentions, Ike Peterson, was Gonzaga's flashiest back and did everything. However, he was unable to make any sustained dent in Oregon's defense.

Oregon gained 229 yards by rushing to 42 for Gonzaga and made 15 first downs to four for Bulldogs. Justice and Olson carried the ball well, but couldn't get loose very often in the face of Oregon's tight defense.

NOTRE DAME IN OPENING BATTLE CRUSH JAYHAWKS

SOUTH BEND, Ind., Sept. 28.—(AP)—Notre Dame's Fighting Irish, led by the dazzling Fred Carideo, who scored two touchdowns, opened their 1935 football campaign before 20,000 fans here today with a smashing 27 to 7 victory over the University of Kansas.

The Jayhawkers, who battled Notre Dame to a scoreless tie two years ago, were rushed off their feet, and only by a long, accurate forward pass from George Haggood to Wade Green, averted a shutout.

The Wojcikowski and Wayne Milner accounted for the other Notre Dame touchdowns.

Minnesota Wins Opener. MINNEAPOLIS, Sept. 28.—(AP)—Bernie Bierman's 1935 Minnesota football team defeated North Dakota State, 26 to 0, in the season's opener today before a crowd of 32,000.

Minnesota appeared unable to function well in the first half. Coming out for the second half, the machinery seemed to work better. In the last period passes resulted in two touchdowns.

EVANSTON, Ill., Sept. 28.—(AP)—Northwestern defeated DePaul, 14 to 0 in the opening game of its football season before a crowd of 20,000. Hugh Dural scored both touchdowns to climax the only sustained drive the Wildcats were able to accomplish, and kicked one of the extra points. Steve Totts accounted for the other point.

STANFORD POWER BEATS SAN JOSE BEARS EKE A WIN

STANFORD STADIUM, Calif., Sept. 28.—(UP)—Stanford's big red football machine opened its drive for national gridiron honors here today with a 35 to 0 victory over San Jose State Teachers' college.

The first victory came easy. With none of the varsity getting into action, the California representatives walked to a 47-0 win over the California Aggies.

KEZAR STADIUM, San Francisco, Sept. 28.—(UP)—The Santa Clara university eleven, exhibiting a brilliant array of spinners, reverses and broken field running, romped over the University of San Francisco football team to a 20 to 7 victory today.

The San Francisco Dons were completely bewildered by the varsity of the Santa Clara Broncos attack. More than 25,000 fans saw the game. The issue was never in doubt.

STATERS TRAMPLE WILLAMETTE WHEN STAR BACKS FAIL

Salem Squad Meets Strong Competition After Slow Start — Corvallis Wins, 26 to 0.

CORVALLIS, Ore., Sept. 28.—(AP)—Oregon State's football team served notice it was definitely on the aggressive today when it smothered Willamette university, co-champion of the northwest conference, under a 26 to 0 score.

Coch Lon Steiner used every Beaver combination available—and all three of them scored.

Oregon state got underway in the second quarter when Cassery, Beaver substitute took a pass behind the Willamette goal. Scott, fullback, plunged over for another six points in the third period and Shultz, right end, took Gray's pass for the third counter a few minutes later. Bob Patrick, substitute left half, slipped over from the one-yard line for the final counter near the end of the game.

Willamette's highly-touted backfield from Newark, N. J.—Johnny Oravec and Dick Welzberger—couldn't get going against the Beavers who held the visitors to 14 yards from scrimmage while piling up 12 first downs for themselves.

About 4,000 persons saw Oregon State's green ball carriers ripen rapidly under a boiling sun as the Beavers blasted Willamette hopes of winning from their ancient rivals.

Coch "Spec" Keene's outfit showed to good advantage but met unexpectedly strong competition from the Pacific coast conference entry.

SPARKLING IDAHO TEAM DOWNED BY WASHINGTON, 14-0

WASHINGTON STADIUM, Seattle, Sept. 28.—(UP) Two of Coach Jimmy Phelan's sparkling junior backs carried the Washington Huskies to a 14-0 victory this afternoon over the best looking Idaho football team that had appeared in this stadium for years.

Just 30 seconds before the second period ended, Haines fought his way off Idaho's right tackle, cut back quickly then zigzagged his way behind line interference for a 47-yard touchdown sprint and scored standing up.

Early in the fourth period, Fullback Nowogroski, on an inside buck, drove hard and fast for 20 yards for Washington's second touchdown.

A crowd of approximately 16,000 fans watched the game and acclaimed the snappy, well-coached Idaho team under a big summer sun. Early in the game Coach Ted Bank's team started an offensive drive that appeared certain for a touchdown. Halfback Clarence Devlin and Fullback Ross Sundberg flashed through Washington's line for long gains and drove to the Husky seven-yard mark for a first down as the opening period ended. Sundberg rammed right tackle for two and a half yards, then picked up two more at right guard. On an end-around play Norman Iverson lateraled to Halfback Lewis Rich, who was running full stride. He fumbled the ball and Halfback Jimmie Cain of Washington picked it up and ran 99 yards for what fans thought was a touchdown.

However, the officials called the ball back, since a defunctive cannot advance a fumbled lateral after it has touched the ground. Quarterback Elmer Legg punted out safely from Washington's one-yard line and Idaho's best scoring chance faded.

HIGH TEAM HOLDS TINY TEAM TIES MIGHTY ALABAMA ILLINOIS UPSET

Wisconsin Loses To South Dakota In Opening Tilt—Fighting Irish Flash.

After 48 minutes of battering at a vastly heavier Alumni team yesterday afternoon, the Medford high school football team missed scoring by one yard late in the last quarter, the game kicked out of danger, and the grade ended three minutes later, in a 0-0 tie, after the Tigers had chalked up eight first downs to four for the grads.

The Tigers showed great promise and at times flashes of brilliant football and shook Bayliss, Lewis, Smith, Ettinger and Sakraida loose for nice gains, but for the whole first half their offensive and defensive work was ragged, with Lloyd Hammack, Alumni center, breaking through to consistently smother their efforts.

The ball saw-sawed back and forth in the middle of the field, neither team threatening seriously to score in the whole first half. After the half the Tigers came onto the field and started their fireworks, obviously having received some pointed remarks from Coach Bowerman.

Their delayed bucks and weak-side spinners clicked nicely, and their passes were connecting better. In the last quarter the break came when Bob Ettinger, speedy little quarterback, intercepted Swanson's wide pass, and raced to the 22 yard line before being forced out of bounds.

From then on a desperate effort was made to score, with the high school opening up with the weak-side spinner they had been saving. In three plays through the same hole, Sakraida got to the 10 yard line. On the next play the Alumni got off side, and the ball went to the five yard line. Line plays took the ball to within a yard of the line, but an off-side penalty brought it back out to the sixth. Smith threw a beautiful pass to Kunzman, but the Alumni bottled him for no gain, and a line buck by Smith stopped cold.

The Alumni took the ball there, and punted out to Sakraida.

Sakraida started for the goal, 30 yards away, but fumbled, and the grade recovered. Bayliss was knocked out on the play, but quickly recovered. The game ended with Swanson tossing desperate passes in an attempt to score in the last half minute.

Outstanding linemen for the Tigers was Kunzman, who played a fiery game and snagged one seemingly impossible pass high in the air, while three men attempted to guard him. For the rest of the game they kept him pretty well bottled up, but his taking of a short pass and lateraling to Ettinger almost paved the way for a touchdown.

The green line, with Grow, Ettinger, Blair, Wilson and Baker all new to the varsity, showed fight and cleverness, and if they progress as fast in the next few weeks as they have in the last, they will be definitely in the running for the southern Oregon honors, according to the alumni stars who played against them.

Dickinson, as guard, was consistently in on Alumni advances, and did some sweet blocking.

Outstanding for the Alumni were Hammack, Lindly and Harrison on the line, and Swanson and Knips in the backfield. The team looked big enough for college rating, and had the members been in condition they would have formed as formidable a team as could have been picked.

WISCONSIN LOSES TO SOUTH DAKOTA IN OPENING TILT—FIGHTING IRISH FLASH.

The woolly lambs of intercollegiate football roared like lions yesterday and cut the big fellows right down to their own size.

Cornell, Illinois, Wisconsin and Virginia all were beaten and Alabama, Rose Bowl champion, was tied as the 1935 season formally got under way in spectacular style.

Bob Zuppke's Illini, hailed in advance as possible dark-horse contenders for the Big Ten crown fell before Ohio university outfit, 6-0, and Wisconsin's Rangers were upset by South Dakota State, 13-6, in the Midwest's two big form reversals.

Cornell, although threatening often, could not develop a scoring punch, and went down before St. Lawrence university of Canton, N. Y., 12-8, Virginia, of the southern conference, was beaten.

The biggest shock of all, however, was the failure of Alabama's crimson tide to get better than a 7-7 draw with Howard of Birmingham. Missing the scoring punch provided last year by the Dixie Howell-Don Hutson combination, the tide found itself held in check by the smaller school's stalwart defense.

Notre Dame, aiming at regaining its former position around the top, trounced Kansas of the Big Six, 28-7, while Minnesota, the nation's power-house in 1934, had to turn loose some extra steam in the second half to turn back North Dakota State, 26-6.

Nebraska, go-favorite with Kansas State for the Big Six crown this year, whipped Chicago easily, 28-7.

In the east only Navy, Colgate, Dartmouth and Villanova lived up to advance notices. Navy thoroughly trounced William and Mary, 30-9, the same margin by which Colgate's Red Raiders whipped Niagara. Dartmouth had no uneasy minutes in a 39-0 conquest of Norwich, and Villanova battered Ursinus, 31-0. Pitt's Panthers, however, had trouble with Wake Forest, winning only 14-0, and Fordham had to score twice in the final quarter to whip Franklin and Marshall, 14-7. West Virginia got no better than a scoreless tie with West Virginia Wesleyan.

Among the southern powers Duke's machine rode rough shod over South Carolina, 47-0, and Clemson spilled Virginia Poly, 28-7, in another southern conference game. Tulane, southeastern conference array, ran over Virginia Military, 44-0, in an impressive display of power. Ray Morrison's Vanderbilt outfit won the only southern conference game of the day, a 14-9 victory over a scrappy Mississippi array.

Oklahoma's Sooners, making their first start under the leadership of Biff Jones, scored a hard-earned 3-0 triumph over Colorado university.
