Mayor Frank Shaw introduced the chief executive and praised him for his work in forwarding the Boulder dam work.

Mayor Shaw also introduced "our honored and beloved guest," Mrs. Roosevelt.

Dressed in a smart red ensemble, Mrs. Roosevelt arose and smiled at the crowd, waving happily.

The party was roundly applauded as it drove out of the coliseum.

Backed streets greeted the entourage en route to the stadium from the train.

The president stopped at the University of Southern California, where on the steps of the administration building he received the degree of doctor of laws.

The president received the degree standing in his car, which was surrounded by students. He made a brief response.

After the coliseum appearance the party made a tour of the city schools, the University of California at Los Angeles, and the national soldiers' home at Sawtelle.
