FALL OF ETHIOPIA 'VERDUN' NEAR

Airplanes and Tanks Lead Advance Upon Key City of Aduwa

ROME, Oct. 4.—(AP)—A government spokesman announced tonight that Italian troops have captured Adigrat, 25 miles east of Aduwa, but that Aduwa had not yet been taken. He said he was unable as yet to report the casualties.

The War in Brief

Italy hurled 100,000 soldiers at Aduwa, in northernmost Ethiopia today, and claimed the fall of the city, locale of Ethiopia's proudest victory in 1896, was imminent.

The fascist columns had advanced to the hills ten miles away, commanding the plain on which the city is situated.

Bombing planes soared overhead and tanks, lumbering overland, sprayed bullets to lead the advance of the troops into the highlands.

Those forces already in position held their ground without difficulty.

Tanks Terrible.

Italians asserted that "very heavy casualties" had been inflicted upon the natives who were terrified by the sight of the death-dealing, mysterious tanks.

An authoritative source declared that while the western advance moved on 30,000 Italian troops were massed near the border of Italian Somaliland to the eastward, ready to advance into the rich province of Aduwa.

They were equipped with the most modern engines of war, including the new "scorcher" tanks, capable of a speed of 45 miles per hour, and equipped with two machine guns.

Other columns were reported poised for a drive on Harar, key city, capital of the province of that name, with the objective of cutting the Djibouti-Addis Ababa railway, Ethiopia's only means of bringing in supplies from abroad.

Planes to Bomb Bridges.

Bombing planes based at Asmara and other strategic aviation centers, were expected to lead shortly hundreds of troops of high explosive bombs, to be dropped on the railway bridges over the Hawash river.

Walwal, site of the historic skirmish that touched off the whole Italo-Ethiopian quarrel, was said to be the scene of another concentration of Italian fighting men.

Italians claimed today the recent heavy rains in East Africa, just now letting up, may prove to have been a blessing in disguise for the invaders.

Although they left the roads impassable and turned rivers into torrents, they filled water holes, solving for the time at least the question of providing water for the swiftly moving troops.

100,000 Men in Area.

(The Asmara correspondent of Le Temps reported to Paris that General Raissa, chief of staff of General De Bono's army, said more than 100,000 men, comprising six divisions, auxiliary troops, were involved in the Italian operations in the Aduwa region.)

Italian cavalry and infantry swept farther into Ethiopia today behind an air squadron flight in which Vittorio and Bruno Mussolini, the premier's two sons, participated.

The fight was undertaken by the "Lion's Head" squadron under the express orders of the high command. The planes penetrated to an objective beyond the frontier.

Upon their return, several hours later, it was announced they had "brilliantly completed their mission."

On the ground, the troops and infantry moved within sight of Aduwa—where the Italians hope to wipe out the memory of their defeat of 40 years ago.

Tell of Bombing.

The official version of yesterday's bombing of Aduwa and Adigrat follows:

After bombing the fortifications at Aduwa, Count Galeazzo Ciano, son-in-law of Il Duce, flew over Adigrat. There he dropped his remaining bombs upon a small group as the fortifications directed a heavy fire at his plane. The squadron returned to its base after completing the operations without a casualty.

Moving forward without noteworthy obstruction, the fascist troops forded the shallow mountain torrents of the Marka river.

They pushed on steadily by new paths to the village of Doro Tade, equidistant between the river and Aduwa.

The advance column of Eritrean cavalry encompassed only 20 kilometers (about 12 miles) from Aduwa, commanding all approaches.

Captain Noel, former county judge and sheriff of Malheur county, underwent a serious operation September 25.

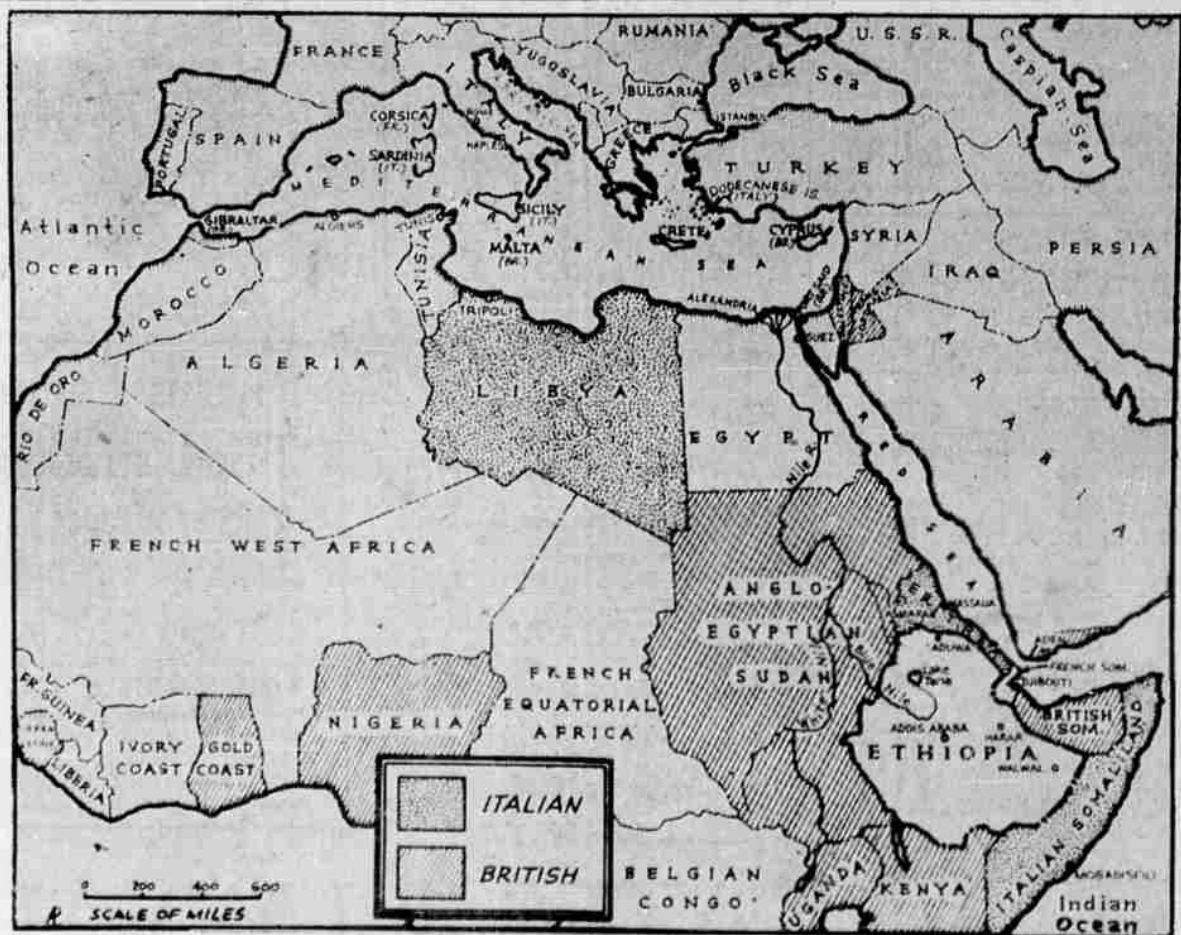
RETAIL DEALERS OUTLINE PLANS

WHERE CHEST DOLLARS GO

In order to show the actual application of Community Chest funds in relieving distress, the Jackson County Public Health association has prepared a series of brief case histories for publication prior to the chest drive, October 9-11. For obvious reasons, names are withheld.

He was not dull, just word blind. But no one knew that, not even the local boy himself, until he came to the clinic conducted by Harry Dixon, nurse specialist, under auspices of the Jackson County Public Health association, one of the worthy organizations to be benefited in this year's Community Chest drive.

He had suffered as only a 12-year-old boy can. And he had suffered in silence, because since the time he had first entered school he had been unable to learn. Then one day one of the county nurses, who are constantly trying to solve all children's handicaps, arranged for him to attend the clinic. Dr. Dixon diagnosed his case and the problem was solved. The high mental ability of the teachers had always suspected, but failed to find, was there. The boy was not dull, but suffering from that affliction commonly known as "word blind."

This discovery was just one in a long list reported yesterday by county nurses, when reviewing the unlimited benefits brought to Jackson county by the annual visitation of Dr. Dixon, whose trips to Medford are made possible by the Jackson County Public Health association.

MARTIN STUDYING SITUATION IN K. F.
