ing the attitude of France in the event the British fleet, now operating in the Mediterranean sea, "precautionary" matter, should be attacked, but there was no immediate announcement as to the nature of this response.

French sources said they believed that an application of sanctions against Italy would take at least six weeks, provided the league approves of such action.

The full cabinet met at the Elysee palace with President Albert Lebrun presiding. After the three hour session, the following communique was issued:

Laval Makes Report

"Premier Laval made a complete report on the international situation, especially on the deliberations under way in the League of Nations. The cabinet, on his motion, approved the terms of the French government's answer to the recent British note in

which the British asked what the attitude of France would be in the event Great Britain were attacked while carrying out league orders.

"The cabinet was unanimously in agreement with the premier on the positions taken and to be taken in France at Geneva on the Italo-Ethiopian question and expressed confidence in him and in his conduct of negotiations in the league."

AIRPLANES, TANKS LEAD ADVANCE ON KEY CITY, ADUWA

General De Bono issued a proclamation to tribesmen of the Mareb river sector, telling them the Italian troops were advancing and warning them to go about their businesses tranquilly to avoid a conflict.

Woe to Tribesmen.

"Woe to all who diffuse false news or distasteful public order," said the proclamation, addressed to frontier tribesmen in Ethiopia and Eritrea alike. "I shall be inexorable!"

It was issued simultaneously with a proclamation at Mequedelo, Italian Somaliland, declaring both Eritrea and Somaliland to be under full martial law.

The Mareb hitherto marked the border of Italy's colony of Eritrea and the Tigre region of Ethiopia.

Details of the advance, reported to military quarters here, indicated it was ordered by General De Bono almost before the echoes of Mussolini's radio speech to the mobilized Italian millions died away Wednesday.

During the advance, an air squadron led by Count Galeazzo Ciano, Mussolini's son-in-law, bombed the fortress of Aduwa yesterday in reprisal for reported artillery fire from the Ethiopian side, which molested scouting of the territory.

Drops First Bomb.

Count Ciano himself launched the first aerial bombs over Aduwa, officials said, while leading a squadron of seven bombardment planes. No loss was suffered by the Italian squadron, the authorities said. "The extent of casualties in Aduwa was unknown."

The vantage point gained by the cavalry permitted them to swoop down upon the Aduwa defenses virtually at will. The village of Daro Tacle dominates the Aduwa valley.

Italian officers were jubilant at the precision with which their first advance took place. They explained with great gratification that this same territory was relinquished by Italy after the rout at Aduwa in 1896, and that this was the first time since then that an Italian army had crossed the Mareb.

Officers scouted that other localities in the Tigre region already spoken of as having been "regained for Italy" echoed in the late 1890's. They said the sector would bear this marching cadence again within a few days.

These localities are Abba and Carima, ten kilometers southeast of Aduwa, and the villages of Macelle,

Adigrat and Alagi. Each of these centers feeds on a territory half again as large as Switzerland.

Cavalry Leads Advance.

The forward force, reports to military quarters here said, consists of a strong advance column of Eritrean cavalry under General Alessandro Pirato-Biroli.

Mussolini selected this crafty, 68-year-old desert and mountain fighter to act as one of the "big six" generals to whom he confided the responsibility for Italy's forces in East Africa.

Experienced with natives in the sacred and rocky of Libyan campaigns, General Pirato-Biroli was assigned to command the native troops of Eritrea and to see that the tribesmen observed the best traditions of Italian arms.

His native cavalrymen were supported by large detachments of Italian infantrymen, tank corps and field artillery, the numbers and identifications of which were kept a military secret.

The "overhead eyes" of this advance army were supplied by the "desperate" scouting and bombardment air squadrons commanded by Count Ciano.

Officers of this squadron include Il Duce's sons, Vittorio and Bruno. They did not participate in the bombing of Aduwa yesterday, being engaged in aerial scouting elsewhere.

No Vaccination Now.

Military headquarters experts, awaiting the orders of the day, recalled that it was in the region being occupied that General Baldissera, after the old defeat at Aduwa, regathered his forces of 40,000 Italian and native soldiers and, after surprising the Ethiopian garrison at Adigrat, was ready to march on Addis Ababa.

That he did not do so is credited now to the vaccination of the Italian government of that time. Today, officials said, there would be no vaccination.

They were uncertain, however, whether General De Bono would follow up immediately the advantage gained by his troops or wait until the reinforcements he had time to push reinforcements for a grand assault on Aduwa.

There, on a plateau 7500 feet high, 120,000 Ethiopians in 1898 overwhelmed an Italian army of 18,000, killing and wounding 8000 Italians, taking 3000 prisoners, 85 cannon, arms and munitions. Generals DeBorville and Arimondi died in the fighting.
