So Hollway explained to Holden that his radio station was really operating and to prove it, he showed Ed a telegram just received from San Jose, fifty miles away.

So Ed. Holden appeared at the microphone for the first time. His stuff was a riot. Three hundred and eighty-seven crystal sets were tuned in! From then on, radio grew and Holden grew until today he is heard all over the world in every English speaking territory, state or province. The demand for his quaint view-

STUDENT INCREASE OFFERS PROBLEM TO UNIVERSITIES

PHILADELPHIA (UP)—The nationwide increase in college enrollment will present a serious problem to colleges and universities in the next decade, according to a Temple University report of the educational situation.

Youth will demand greater facilities for a higher education, a better organization of educational programs, the survey showed, and if such training becomes necessary in obtaining employment, the public must bear the expense.

The report is the result of a nationwide survey and presents a consensus of opinions of potential college students and those already enrolled.

The renewed interest in higher education and the tremendous increase in enrollment, according to Millard E. Gladfelter, who prepared the report, indicates a faith in the future and an optimism that promises an early recovery.

Gladfelter said the increase in college and university enrollment is due largely to the depression and unemployment among high school graduates.

He added, however, that in interviewing hundreds of applicants he was impressed by the hope and idealism of modern youth.

"While many students are interested in college for personal gain," Gladfelter concluded, "the majority of high school graduates today are more interested in their position and service to society."

MIDWEST CLINIC TO BE ATTENDED BY 1000 DOCTORS

OMAHA, Neb. (UP)—More than 1,000 midwest physicians will assemble here October 28 for the annual Omaha Midwest Clinical society meeting, providing post-graduate study under some of America's most distinguished medical men.

In announcing the 1935 schedule of lectures, Dr. J. P. Lord, president of the organization, said attendance had shown a growth each year since its inception.

"Our first assembly was attended by about 600 physicians and surgeons," Lord said. "Last year we had more than 800. The assembly is one of the most vital influences in Midwestern medicine and the fact that more than 1,000 physicians now come here annually for a week of post-graduate study emphasizes how new the fact that Omaha, with its two medical schools and fine hospital facilities, is one of the greatest medical centers of America."

Sewell, San Francisco, eye, ear, nose and throat; and Udo J. Wile, Ann Arbor, Mich., dermatologist.

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 4.—(UP)—State Sorester Lynn S. Cronmiller today reported that rain and fog had driven to the ground and controlled fires that ravaged Oregon forests.

A half-inch of rain in southwestern Oregon turned back the Coos county fire which had been driving inland and gave fire fighters the upper hand. Approximately 20,000 acres were believed burned over, although adequate estimates will not be available for several days.

All other Oregon fires were controlled or drowned out and Cronmiller believed the fire season is over.

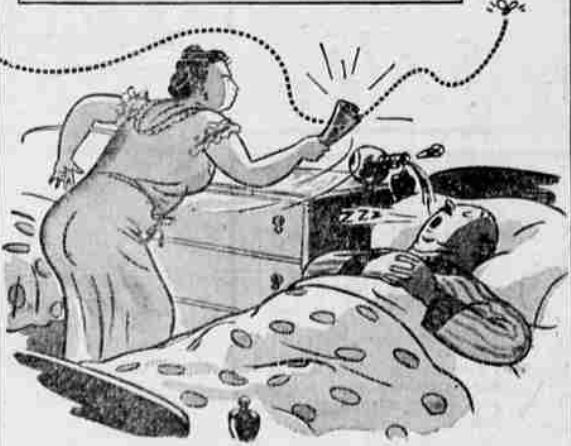
