



### COAST BIG SHOTS TEST STRENGTH IN SATURDAY GAMES

#### Bears and Gaels Meet in First 'Natural' of Season — Oregon Faces Utes — O.S.C. Meets U.C.L.A.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 4.—(AP)—The Pacific coast's thousands of football faithful, their appetites whetted by last week's opening skirmishes, trek stadiumward tomorrow to witness games calculated to test the strength of major contenders from Seattle to Los Angeles.

Sixty-five thousand fans are expected to jam the big concrete bowl at Berkeley, where University of California's Bears and the St. Mary's Gaels meet in the first big "natural" of the 1935 season.

Indians Tackle Dons  
At least half as many will gather at Kezar stadium here to see the Stanford University Indians tackle the Dons of the University of San Francisco in a game designed to give an early insight into the big red team's chances of winning its third consecutive coast conference title and Rose Bowl bid.

Smaller, but equally football-hungry crowds will congregate at Los Angeles, where Southern California's Trojans will try issues with Amos A. Stagg's Little College of the Pacific eleven; at Seattle, site of a brand new gridiron match between the Universities of Washington and Santa Clara; and at Portland, where Oregon State meets University of California at Los Angeles in the day's only conference clash.

Webfoots Face Utes  
An inter-sectional contest at Eugene, Ore., pits University of Utah's Rocky mountain champions against the University of Oregon. Idaho and Gonzaga tangle at Spokane and Washington State college takes it easy against little Willamette.

Rightfully holding the spotlight as a tradition-hoary classic of the bay region, the California-St. Mary's game this year finds Ed Madigan's veteran Gael lineup a pronounced favorite over a Bear level which will include at least four sophomores, three of them in the backfield.

### Blue-Eyed Girl Gunner Beats Men at Own Game

EAST LYNNE, Mo.—(AP)—Meet the little woman who plays a man's game and wins!

She is Mrs. Lela Hall, slender, blue-eyed trapshooter who thrilled her home town and the rest of the nation with her performance in the Grand American at Vandalia, O.

Wielding a heavy gun with the skill of a veteran, she broke 198 out of 200 targets to tie with two men for the class B crown and then smashed 25 straight in the shoot-off to take the title.

Only Woman "All-America"  
It was the highest score a woman gunner ever made in big league competition. Last year she was made a member of the all-America trapshoot team, the only woman selected. She had a perfect score last spring with 100 straight targets in the interstate tournament at Kansas City.

Mrs. Hall, 27 years old, and weighing slightly more than 100 pounds, has been firing since she was 16. She inherited the enthusiasm of her father, H. C. Ammon, who was a crack shot. Mrs. Hall won from her own sex easily, having been several times champion of Missouri women shooters.

Her husband, Harold M. Hall, was a trapshooter until he started competing with his wife. There used to be several in this vicinity. Now there is only Mrs. Hall. The others have retired with Mr. Hall.

Beats the Men.  
She has made a practice of calling long distance to her husband, who operates a cafe here, when she wins a trapshooting event. Calls have been frequent in the last several years.

The day Mrs. Hall bested her masculine opponents, friends went to

the cafe to tell her husband she was tied with Dr. L. E. Bette, Waukeon, O., and Dillie Craig of Berry, Ky., and there was to be an overtime event for the championship. Mr. Hall went about his duties and waited for the call. It came.

Last year the little woman from East Lynne broke 97 out of 100 to finish third in the Grand American, the first woman ever to land in the money in the trapshooting classic.

John Reddy, formerly of Medford and now night news editor of two Spokane radio stations and correspondent there for the Transradio Press, keeps a close eye on athletic doings at Gonzaga university, where "Leapin' Leo" Ghehardt, Ronald Baker and Dick Lewis are now swarming on the gridiron.

Reddy informs us that Ghehardt was hurt early in the season, receiving a nasty cleat cut on his face, necessitating several stitches, and that he has not yet fully recovered. Ghehardt was doing fine, Reddy says, until the injury. Baker hurt a hip in the first scrimmage against the varsity, and has been laid up ever since, but the freshman coach lays great hopes in him once he's back in harness. With two of the Medford contingent out of the picture for the time, there is still a bright ray left in Dick Lewis.

Says Reddy: "But Dick Lewis—ah, there is a boy! Two weeks ago I was going around telling McGrath (the freshman coach) to just wait until basketball got here and then watch Dick go, and now Mac is coming around to tell me he's the best ball player Medford ever sent up here. He's going like a house afire. He cut the first string on the second night out, against a roll-call of all state monkeys, and has been the outstanding fresh back ever since."

Lewis is the brother of Ray Lewis, now playing for the Medford high school, and this is his first year of football. Reddy continues to extol his virtues for two pages. On the first night out he was called to duty on the second string, at right half-back. He tore the first string line and backs to ribbons on that night, and the next day made his bow on the first string. From then until now he has been ripping and slashing his way to the position of outstanding freshman backfield man.

Reddy states that Baker will undoubtedly be first string before the season is over, and that Ghehardt is showing great in practice. Ghehardt is small and possibly will never play regularly on the varsity, being a shade too tiny for the Notre Dame system used at Gonzaga, but it is a certainty that the arvel-bipped little back will see plenty of action when the going gets tough.

Of the 75 freshman football aspirants at the University of Oregon, who turned out under the new coach, "Honest John" Warren of Astoria, only 50 are left. Of these 50, it is estimated that 10 or 15 more will drop out within the next week or two, so Honest John won't have to do too much picking to choose the squad which will represent the school on October 12, when the squad comes to Medford to play the Southern Oregon Normal eleven.

The last college football game of any importance to local fans, that was held here, was in 1929 when the University of Oregon Frosh met the Oregon State Rooks at VanScococ field. That was the year that Callison first went to Oregon, and most of his wander team from here followed him to Eugene, with the exception of Red McDonald, who threw his fortunes with the Beavers. And it was the perverse McDonald who sneaked a pass in the open to defeat his old team mates.

### WRESTLERS DIVORCE SUIT SHOWS HE COULD TAKE IT

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 4.—(UP)—Milton W. Downs, former heavyweight wrestler, had a defense for every attack of his 107-pound wife, Mildred, except one, he admitted in divorce court today.

"I defended myself against everything she did," Down told Judge Joseph Sroul, in a hearing on Mrs. Downs' suit for separate maintenance, "except when she poured water on my mattress. I couldn't do anything about that."

He said when he sat in a chair, his wife kicked it out from under him. So he moved to another chair. She pushed that on top of him, so he stood up. She pointed a pistol pointblank at his chest and pulled the trigger, he said, "but nothing

happened—I had taken the bullets out."

He said she attacked him with an ice-pick, a fork, a meat cleaver, a butcher knife and a milk bottle. He dodged every one except the milk bottle and "caught that on my fifth vertebra."

He said she grabbed two handfuls of his hair, bit him on the back, kicked his shins, and when he finally went to bed, she pulled the mattress to the floor and poured water on him.

"I put on my hat so she couldn't pull my hair," Downs said. "I donned my heavy overcoat to keep her from biting me. I put on my long rubber boots so when she kicked me in the shins, it wouldn't hurt. Then I laid down on the wet mattress and went to sleep."

### SPEEDY LINEUP TO START FOR OREGON

This year's team is one of the speediest ever to represent Oregon. The line averages 194 pounds and is made up on fast, raw-boned youths who average six-feet-one in height.

The backfield also is fast, considering the tremendous drive. The brunt of the running attack is carried by Fullback Frank Micek, who averaged 5.5 yards in 17 tries against Gonzaga.
