

# New Faces Will Feature Grappling Festival at Armory Tonight

## FOUR ENTRANTS WILL SHOW STUFF HERE FIRST TIME

### Hans Schroeder, Andree Adoree, Jack Londos And Babe Estes On Card—Speed Rule of Evening.

Warfare opens on the Armory front promptly at 8:30 tonight, for the first Monday wrestling card in Medford. The shift in dates from the usual Thursday affair was announced last week by Mack Lillard, who has signed an impressive array of grapplers for the opening go.

A double main event, with Hans Schroeder of Germany meeting Andree Adoree of France, and Toots Estes meeting Jack Londos assures a meaty evening of grappling. Both are scheduled to wrestle here some time ago but failed to meet his engagement because of an injury received in the north. Schroeder announced today that he will probably be giving the same reason for not returning to that section after their bout tonight.

A flip of a coin will decide which pair of heavyweights will wrestle the final match. The Schroeder-Adoree fracas is sure to prove a battle of giants, while the Estes-Londos battle will be marked by extreme speed. Estes is small for a heavyweight, weighing 180, but his brilliant speed makes him one of the most dangerous men on the coast. Those who have seen Londos perform in Portland and Seattle say that he is also fast, and bigger than Estes.

The first match of the evening, billed as a preliminary, has excited so much interest that Lillard states that it will really make the card a triple main event, when Babe Estes, twin brother of Toots, meets the challenging Marine from Gold Hill, Bob Kennaston, in a bout at Klamath Falls last week. Estes took the first fall with a Boston crab hold, only to have Kennaston bully him out of two more falls with a "Gold Hill" crab hold of his own devising. This hold is the same one with which Kennaston defeated Joe Hubka here in the last bout, and he will probably employ it again tonight.

In a practice scrimmage at the senior high school Saturday morning, the first string handed the second outfit a terrific beating. In the first few minutes of the game, the varsity scored four touchdowns in eight plays. The superiority of the first string is to be expected, of course, but what wasn't to have been expected was the marked improvement in the squad. They outplayed the second string more drive and finesse than they have shown in any previous practice. If it hadn't been for Leo Skradka, on the second outfit because of a knee injury, the first team would have sailed through without much interruption.

After their workout in the morning, most of the team members journeyed to Grants Pass to see the Cave-men go down to defeat before the Klamath Pelicans, 13-7. In a way, it was unfortunate that the locals would see the Pelicans on an off day, for such they certainly had. If their game against the Lakeview outfit a week ago can be taken as a criterion, the Klamath backs were lissam and slow, and the line performed poorly, in striking contrast to the college-like polish they showed against Red McDonald's eleven. Their passing was weak, and they seemed to slow down appreciably after the first Grants Pass game.

We mentioned some time ago that the Klamath team is always on the ground at every opportunity. Every time that a time-out is called by either team, the Klamath players flip to the side. Yesterday we discovered that this is done upon the orders of the coach. He demands that his players flip to the ground, in order to conserve their energy. We still believe that the energy saved is not worth the moral staining lost by the procedure.

The Grants Pass team is big this year. They have one tackle who must weigh at least 215 pounds. And in their backfield they have a lad named Edson who must weigh 170. That Tids boy failed to put in an appearance until late in the third quarter, when he went in as full-back. He steam-rolled into the line, and made at least two yards, and generally fly, on every play. No team can expect to win with only one backfield man, but this Edson helps. The Grants Pass outfit afterwards his line plunges with a passing attack, which bogged down when they withdrew their one clever pass receiver in the last quarter by substituting a place kicker. The kicker egged his right to enter the game by making his conversion good after the lone Grants Pass touchdown, but the passing attack fizzled from then on.
